HORRIBLE MUTILATION

Practiced on Dead After Fierce Fighting at Takum.

Lithuanians Attack One Hundred Cossacks and Kill to the Last Man-Sanguinary Conflicts Between Troops and Revolutionaries In Various Localities In Russia-German

Mitau, Province of Courland, Dec. 17.—(Delayed in transmission.)—The troops, in order to avoid annihilation at the hands of the insurgents, have been forced to abandon the country districts and to concentrate at Rigo. Mitau and Libau, where they actually are standing on the defensive, unable to make head against the insurgents. veral detachments have been defeat

ed.

The garrison at Takum, consisting of a squadron of white dragoons and a company of infantry, not being able to depart in time, was set upon at night and jost its commander, Lieut-Col. Mueller, and thirty men. The insurgents, evading the sentinels, penetrated, the town, and taid wire entanglements in front of the house in which the wearied soldiers were quartered. Then they set fire to the houses, tered. Then they set fire to the houses and the troops rushing out were shot down from the roofs or cut up in the narrow streets. The soldiers retreated in confusion, leaving their dead. The in confusion, leaving their dead. The latter were horribly mutilated by the insurgents, who gouged out their eyes and cut off their ears and hands. The insurgents, who form great bands, have a regular military organization, and are well armed.

Takum, Courtand, Russia, Sunday Dec. 17, wa Stettin, Prussia, Dec. 19.— A special staff correspondent of The Press, who has just arrived here learns that mobs of Lithuanians and Esthonthat mobs of Lithuanians and Esthon-lans yesterday attacked a hundred Cessacks and dragoons, the only mili-tary force stationed in Takum. After wild fighting the soldiers were killed to the last man, their arms and legs cut off and their bodies ripped open. The streets were strewn with bodies and dismembered parts. Six hundred troops arrived here yesterday, with three guns shelled the place and charg-ed the mubs of peasants, who surren-dered or were dispersed.

Batteries of machine guns are stationed at various points of vantage throughout the city and patrols of infantry and Cossacks are everywhere. A specially heavy guard is stationed near the Jewish market.

Services were held in all the churches yesterday and in every barracks the Emperor's order for an increase of pay and food was read. It increases the annual pay from \$1.35 per year to \$3 in case of the ordinary privates, and of from \$3 to 36 for privates of the guard. The pay of the non-commissioned officers is increased in proportion; in the case of the filghest of the sergeants-major amounting to \$36.
