"HOLD-UP" INSURANCE CO.

Eldredge Tells What Mutual Reserve Life Had to Pay to Silence People Who Knew.

New York, Dec. 6.—Instances in which the Mutual Reserve Life paid an aggregate of about \$20,000 in what Vice-President Geo. D. Eldredge of that company called "hold-up" money were related to the investigating committee by Mr. Eldredge yesterday. In one case the company paid \$15,000 to John McDonald, a Philadelphia lawyer, who had been active in organizing the policyholders of the Mutual Reserve into a movement which charged President Frederick Burnham with mismanagement and demanded his removal.

Coon Came Down.

Another instance of a "hold-up," Mr. Eldredge said, was in 1890, when Max Behler, a so-called examiner of the low insurance department, came to New York with his son as an assistant, examined the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company and presented to it a bill for \$489 for the examination. Rather than pay the bill the company withdrew its business from Iowa; but a little later paid that bill and another of \$346 to Behler for a verification of his previous examination in order to get permission to again do business in Iowa.

Eldredge also told how he tried to secure a license for his company to do business in Missouri in 1893, and he said he found that it would have to employ W. H. Phelps as Attorney before he could do so. Phelps got the license for the company in three days and was paid \$5,500.

Equitable Gets Decision.

New York, Dec. 6.—The demurrers of the Equitable Life Assurance Society directors and trustees to the complaint of Rowland D. Burford, who sought to have a just and lawful distribution of the society's surplus, were sustained in the supreme court yesterday.

ONTARIO AND RAILWAYS.

Important Conference of Municipal Representatives Criticizes Law.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—In view of the proposed consolidation of the railway laws at the coming session of the Legislature, Hon. J. S. Hendrie called a conference of the parties interested to discuss the subject. The three principal parties are the Railway Act, the Electric Railway Act, and the Street Railway Act, together with minor acts, which sometimes overlap. It is intended to combine all into one general act.

The gathering began at 11 o'clock yesterday morning in the hall of the Mayor Biggar and Frank McKelcan for Hamilton asked for provision that the agreements of cities with street railway companies should be enforced by the courts. They wanted the ambiguity removed which allows one company to grant running powers over its lines to other companies. They claim that the courts should enforce agreements, as they enforce injunctions.

A. J. Drummond, representing the Western Central Railway, criticized the law relating to capital stock and Sunday traffic. Inter-urban lines should be allowed to run on Sundays, being through lines as such as steam lines were. The uncertainty as to Sunday traffic prevented financiers becoming interested.

An Arbitration Board.

Councillor Richardson of Scarborough contended that renewals of franchises should be in the hands of an arbitration board.

J. B. Dow, solicitor for Whitby Township, contended that franchises should stick to the roads. Public ownership was out of the question in rural districts.

J. Lynch Staunton of Hamilton favored appellate tribunal to which grievances regarding railways might be brought.

To-day other views and suggestions will be heard.

C-B. NOT READY.

Issues Announcement That New Cabinet Will Be Given Dec. 11.

London, Dec. 6.—Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman saw King Edward at Buckingham Palace yesterday and accepted the task of forming a new Cabinet.

The Duke of Devonshire, Liberal Unionist, and former lord president of the council, was among the callers on the new Premier before the latter went to the palace, and in political circles importance is attached to the visit, as possibly signifying some kind of a working agreement on certain points of policy between the anti-protectionist Unionists, of which the Duke has been the recognized leader since his secession from the Balfour Cabinet, and the new Government.

The following official announcement was made last night:

"Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman informed King Edward that he will be unable to submit his proposed arrangements in connection with the formation of a new Government until Dec. 11."

"King Edward left London yesterday afternoon to visit Lord Allington at Criche, Wiltshire."

Crushed Beneath Heavy Load.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—Fred Howard, driver for McKay & Forsythe, lumber dealers, was killed yesterday afternoon that he died an hour later. Howard was driving his team down the grade at Sunnyside, near Hicks' boat-house. He was walking alongside the horses and slipped, the wagon, with its heavy load of lumber passing over his chest, crushing him. He died before he could be taken to the hospital.

Girl of 17 Takes Poison.

Aylmer, Dec. 6.—Beatrice Bentley, a young girl 17 years old, whose parents reside at Eden, Elgin County, committed suicide Monday evening by taking carbolic acid at the home of Henry Miller. She left a letter addressed to a friend in which she stated her intention to take poison, as she was tired of life. No other reason can be given for the rash act.
