The Western Canneries

Report of Last General Meeting

Although the shareholders who attended the general meeting of the Western Canneries held in Regina last month, publicly refused to give any detailed report, that does not mean that The Times did not get a full report of the proceedings. The same thing happened last spring but The Times believed the citizens of all that went on at a meeting of shareholders of a company to which the city was giving privileges. There were 22 shareholders present, only two of whom had been collecting proxies to any extent. These two, C. A. Flour, of Winnipeg, and G. Forster, of Medicine Hat, had been endeavoring to control all the votes they could. At the two meetings last spring F. H. Malcolm and F. G. Forster had, between them, control of the vote with the result that the former received 5,000 shares of common stock, and the latter managing directorship or general manager or something like that. But at this meeting in December all this was changed. C. A. Flour had been east and had talked to the shareholders in Ontario, with the result that he turned up at the meeting with 1610 votes, or 80 per cent of the entire 2,000 votes represented at the meeting. F. G. Forster had only 375 votes and the next highest was 178. Accordingly Mr. Flour had things his own way. This was not used to the detriment of the company has been apparent. The first move was to change the Articles of Association. Clause 11 was altered so that officers may be established in Medicine Hat, Winnipeg or elsewhere in the British Dominion. Clause 6 now allows the company to receive payment on shares in full, allowing a discount of 5 per cent on the balance due on each share after the allotment call has been paid. A change is made making it necessary that, in future, no shareholder can be a director unless he possesses five founder or preference shares. This again, according to The Times information, that only one man (rancher) in this district can be a director, as the shares held by the former directors varied from two to five. C. A. Flour is managing director and no other position was assigned. The directors will meet a quorum. The directors will meet a least every 90 days. Clause 82, which vested 5,000 shares of common stock in F. H. Malcolm was struck out and the following substituted: "The common stock of the company shall be vested in the Board of Directors; subject, however, to any legal right of any holders thereof. Mr. Malcolm moved that the unissued and unsold common stock in the company's treasury be vested in the Board of Directors, but this was defeated. Clause 33 which stipulated that for the right, title, interest and good will acquired from F. H. Malcolm the common stock fully paid should be the consideration, was repealed. All shares previously vested in Malcolm were transferred to the Board of Directors. This includes other staff, etc. It was decided to pay a commission of 5 per cent for the sale of any of the unissued preferred stock, said commission to be due only after the allotment call has been paid. The directors are empowered to sell the necessary amount of stock up to \$200,000, and if necessary can give one share of common stock for every two of preferred stock or they may give a block of stock to any firm underwriting the stock or any part thereof, or may sell it by public issue in London or elsewhere. The directors are empowered to issue bonds, debentures or other securities of the company for sums not less than \$100 each and may pledge or sell the same at such price as shall be deemed expedient, the total issue not to exceed \$100,000. The name of the company was changed to the Central Canada Packing Company. The annual meeting will be on the second Tuesday in May. The names of Hon. R. W. Scott, Hon. Hugh J. Macdonald and Mr. A. B. Barry of Toronto were added to the directorate. The voting power at the meeting was as follows: 104: C. D. Forbes; 79: C. A. Flour, 1,610; A. G. Carter, 7; W. J. Deans, 10; F. H. Malcolm, 14; Robt. Barrack, 178; F. Young, 4; W. J. Hill, 4; C. W. Traynor, 2; James L. Ewing, 5; F. G. Forster, 375; H. S. Martin, 20; A. L. Walter, 8; Scott, 1; H. W. Laird, 1; McPherson, 10; J. P. L. Embury, 26; P. Naimith, 2; S. E. Howarth, 1; W. M. Blain, 1; Andrew Mills, 36; G. H. Marsh, 4; total, 2,502.
