SPELLS DISASTER TO PANAMA CANAL

Boston, Feb. 26.—A sweeping denunciation of the lock system for the Panama canal was made to-night by M. Jean Bunau-Varilla, formerly in charge of the old French canal, to the members of the Commercial club of this city, who two years ago formally approved the present method of construction.

It was declared by the speaker that the giving way of the Gatun dam would destroy the canal in fifteen minutes and prove one of the most dramatic catastrophes in the history of public works. The town of Colon would be wiped out and possibly a whole fleet made prisoners for years. "Such a thing is not a dream, for it is not only probable, but almost certain," said M. Bunau-Varilla. The speaker enumerated four points in which he said errors had been committed in building the dam. First was the under-valuation; second, the reducing of the length of the locks so that they would hardly accommodate vessels already planned, to say nothing of those in years to come; third, the excessive price fixed for dredging a sea level canal; fourth, alleged faulty reports of the base of the dam. Bunau-Varilla declared that there was direct evidence to show that the dam would not stand, principally because of the unequalled distribution of soft blue clay below the dam. In closing he declared that the only solution was a sea level canal 500 feet wide and 45 feet deep, to be dug by dredges.

ALBERTA WILL GUARANTEE BONDS

Edmonton, Feb. 25.—At a session lasting till midnight, practically a unanimous vote of the legislature endorsed the railway policy of the government as set out in the resolution introduced by Premier Rutherford and accompanied by bills to guarantee bonds of the C. N. R. and G. T. P., and other branch lines totalling 1,681 miles with a guarantee of \$27,433,000. Scarcely a corner of the province is left unprotected for, and Alberta will be grid-ironed with railways.

SHOT THE NEGRO.

Birmingham, Ala., Feb. 27.—While handcuffed and sitting in the Sheriff's office at Bessemer, Jim Brown, a negro, was shot and instantly killed by James Robinson, white, father of the girl whom Brown was accused of molesting on Feb. 15th. The attack occurred without warning. Robinson firing four shots into the negro before the deputies standing could interfere. Robinson surrendered. The negro was being taken to Bessemer for preliminary trial.

SWINDLERS GOT A HALF MILLION

Council Bluffs, Col., Feb. 27.—Post Office Inspector Swenson, after a trip to Little Rock, Ark., last night, told of an alleged swindle perpetrated by an organization of men, the head of which he believed is under arrest in Little Rock. In the person of J. C. Maybray, the organization formerly had headquarters in Council Bluffs, to which place it moved from New Orleans. The post office department believes the operation of the organization brought considerable more than half a million dollars. More than a hundred persons in various parts of the country were fleeced out of amounts ranging from \$5,000 to \$25,000 by means of fake races, wrestling contests and other sporting matches. From documentary evidence taken from the trunk of Maybray, it is apparent that a diary was kept of all operations, and the inspector has produced the names of more than a hundred supposed victims of the swindlers. These include the name of Thomas Cal, delegate from Alaska to the National Congress, and men of wealth from all parts of the country. Many bankers are included in the list. A woman's boast of how her husband had won \$20,000 reaching the ears of a wife of the loser, is said to have brought out the clues in the case.

ARBITRATION TREATY.

Washington, Feb. 27.—A general arbitration treaty will be negotiated between the United States and Venezuela as soon as the Minister to be appointed by that country appears in Washington. Under its terms a compromise containing the questions in dispute claims between the two countries, which are to be referred to the Hague court, will be acted upon and sent to the Senate for ratification.
