NEW ADORNMENTS AT ST. LAWRENCE.

Rev. Father Brady Describes the Decorations --Improvements Cost \$20,000.

\$10,000 Gift From Protestant Friends--Bishop Dowling's Double Anniversary.

To those of other denominations who ponder over the adornments in Catholic places of worship a sermon such as preached last night by Rev. Father Brady, rector of St. Lawrence Church, reveals much that at first glance may appear mystifying and meaningless. One realizes after having explained that the elaborate decorations are intended for more than mere display; that each one is symbolic of something capable of inspiring beautiful thoughts and uplifting above worldly things the minds of those who kneel in worship. St. Lawrence, as it stands to-day, is one of the most artistically decorated churches in the country. Within a year \$20,000 has been spent in improvements—surely a notable achievement for a congregation composed almost entirely of working people. In terms of deepest gratitude the pastor thanked them last night for their generosity. The sermon on the significance of ecclesiastical decorations was strikingly appropriate. The text was, "My house shall be a house of prayer."

Mr. John Williams, city bridge engineer at Toronto, died at 1 o'clock Saturday morning after having suffered several months from stomach trouble. He came to Canada in 1870, when he entered the service of the old Great Western Railway at Hamilton. He remained there four years and returned to England. He came to Canada again in 1887, and became mechanical draughtsman in the city engineer's department, Toronto. In a short time he was promoted to the position of bridge engineer. A widow, a son, Mr. Fred Williams, C. E., Cleveland, Ohio, and a daughter, Miss Jenny, well known in musical circles, survive.

A Dairy Farms Competition

A committee composed of leading farmers and dairymen representing the Dairy Cattle Breeders' Association and the Dairymen's Associations of Ontario, have completed arrangements for the holding this year of a dairy farms competition through Ontario. The prizes will consist of 60 gold and silver medals and diplomas, as well as a large number of special prizes, the details of which have not yet been arranged. The Province will be divided into four districts as follows: From Kingston east, from Kingston to Yonge street, Toronto; western Ontario, north and south of a line running from Hamilton to Goderich. There will be a competition this year for the best farms in each district, and five gold and ten silver medals will be offered this year in each district. The farms will be judged twice: once about July 1, and again some time during December, thus giving the judges an opportunity to see the farms under winter and summer conditions. Next year the farms in eastern Ontario and all farms in western Ontario which win prizes in the competition this year will be allowed to compete in special competitions to decide the best farm in eastern Ontario and the best farm in western Ontario. Two years from now it is proposed to hold a final competition, in which the leading farms from both eastern and western Ontario will compete to decide the best farm in the Province. Exceptionally fine prizes will be offered in this final competition. All branches of farm work will be included in the competition. In all 1,000 points will be offered. These points have been subdivided as follows: Hogs and surroundings 150; farm buildings 150; live stock 200; crops 200; farm management 75. Several prizes will be offered to the farms that score the highest points on the house and surroundings, on poultry, on orchards and other similar departments. Competitions of this kind were held in Ontario some 25 years ago, and created great interest. The gold medal farmer in the Province at that time was Mr. Simpson Bennett, the well known Farmers' Institute speaker, who now lives in Toronto. The committee which has charge of the competition is composed of Messrs. H. Glendinning, of Manilla; G. A. Gillespie, of Peterboro, representing the Eastern Ontario Dairymen's Association; C. A. Dempsey, of Stratford; and Mr. R. Wallace, of Burgessville, representing the Western Ontario Dairymen's Association; Mr. W. W. Ballantyne, of Stratford; D. Duncan, of Don; George McKenzie, of Thornhill; R. F. Hicks, of Newtonbrook; Gordon Gooderham, of York Mills; Simpson Rennie and W. G. Ellis, of Toronto, and H. B. Cowan, of Peterboro, the secretary. Full particulars about the competition may be obtained from the secretary. Already a number of leading farmers in Ontario have indicated their intention to take part in the competition, which promises to create a great interest and be productive of much good. The dignity of labor may be all right, but lots of us are not hankering after dignity.
