

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

Mrs. Wilson Terry of Still Water, N. Y., drowned her two months old child by plunging it head first into a slop tub; then she committed suicide by drowning.

Advisers from Manitoba say that the wheat crop will reach twenty millions of bushels and nearly all of good quality. The yield is turning out much better than ever the most sanguine anticipated, and Manitoba farmers have no complaint to make.

A fourteen-year-old boy named George Elwood, died at Philadelphia on Wednesday last from the effects of smoking cigarettes. The boy, who was a member of the "Cigarette Club," had smoked a pack of cigarettes in half an hour.

Wm. H. Stevens, who is spending the summer at Riverside, K. I., received a letter the past week from solicitors, in Montreal, notifying him that he had fallen heir to an immense inheritance in that vicinity through the recent death of his aunt. The estate is represented to be worth several millions, and will be shared by Stevens and two other relatives.

Captain the Hon. Charles John Coventry, second son of the Earl of Coventry, who on July 28th was sentenced to three months imprisonment for connection with Jameson's raid into the Transvaal, has been released from Hill way jail, the physicians certifying that further confinement would be dangerous to his life.

Peter S. McNally, the expert Boston swimmer, arrived at the Narragansett, Rhode Island pier on a steamer from Newport at 11.12 A.M. Wednesday last. Mr. McNally left Newport at 6.35 A.M. and swam the entire distance without assistance.

John Daly, the Irish dynamite man, who has been serving a life sentence in Portland prison, was released on Thursday last. Daly arrived in London Thursday. Although he is nominally at liberty he is still attended by officers of Portland prison.

In the races at Amherst, on Friday last, Dalgay Cunningham captured first place in the 2.30 class, with the time 2:28. The best time in this class was 2:28. In the 2.45 class Kippack won first money, Button second and Orion third. Best time 2:32.

On Sunday last a fire broke out in a house on Vine St., Charlottetown, Mass. O'Brien, one of the inhabitants, jumped from a third story window to the sidewalk, receiving injuries from which he died instantly. Her son and daughter were also seriously injured.

The four-year-old child of Matthew Smith, Esq., of Pleasant View Hotel, Hampton, had a miraculous escape from instant death on the 20th. inst. The child was in a room in the third story of the hotel and hearing the guests laughing it ran to the open window in lost its balance and fell a distance of 23 feet.

A sad accident occurred at Lower Montague yesterday afternoon, by which Howard Atkins, third son of Benjamin Atkins of that place, lost his life. We glean the following particulars from the Guardian: Young Atkins was out sailing in company with Chas. B. Perkins of this city, when Albert Atkins a younger brother of the deceased went out in a row boat and wanted to be taken in tow.

The well-known trotting stallion "Harry C." owned by Mr. H. C. Conolly of this city met with a fatal accident on Friday last. Mr. Conolly and a friend were out driving when in the vicinity of Upper Portland street, the carriage came in contact with another team, Mr. Conolly and his friend were thrown out, and the horse had his fore leg so badly broken that he had to be shot. The horse was a valuable one with a record of 2:29.

The Labrador fishery is reported as being a failure this season. This means starvation for thousands of fishermen next winter.

THE C. P. R. Station at Joliette, Que., was on Monday last robbed of six thousand dollars belonging to the Canadian Express Co.

MR. JOHN PONSOME has bought all the make of the Government factory Island cheese up to August 1st, which amount to about 1,900 boxes.

A CLOUDBURST struck the city of Mo-gallon, New Mexico, on the 22nd. inst., demolishing about thirty houses and rendering 100 families homeless.

BRUCE G. GRAY, C., a representative of one of Halifax's oldest and most respected families died at that place on Friday last after an illness of several days.

THE P. W. College and Normal School will re-open on Tuesday, September 1st at 10 A.M. Tuition fees must be paid to the Provincial Secretary before registration.

A FIRE occurred at the Buffalo Driving Park, on the 23rd. inst., destroying half the covered track and the exhibition building. The fire is supposed to be incendiary. Loss over \$300,000.

SIR DAVID MACHESON died on board the steamer Labrador, on Sunday the 16th, while on the passage from Liverpool to Quebec. The steamer arrived at Rimouski Friday morning last.
