### NON-SECTARIAN.

A petrified cross, supposed to

at Rochester, Pa. It was buried in a mass of limestone rock, four feet Beneath the surface of the earth. Crosses of this design, and leaden plates, inscribed with the royal design of France, were buried through western Pennsylvania during the year 1749. A Captain Celeren was the leader of the company who did this work. He left Lachine, near Montreal, at the date mentioned, with M. de Contrecour, afterward commander of Fort Duquesne, and a Jesuit priest. There were in the company, besides eight officers, six cadets, one hundred and eighty Canadian civilians. At stated distances on their route from Canada they buried the leaden plates, claiming the country for France, while the priest buried the wooden cross to symbolize the work of the Church. disclosed was the petrified cross recently found.
