### Morris Hard Up Against the People!

The Hon. P. T. McGrath is still harping on the string of the fault he alleges we committed in putting a political gloss on the purchase of the Evening Herald by supporters of the Morris Party.

Mr. McGrath dealt with this project as political, but he objects to any political colour being given to the purchase of the Evening Herald which is now being used as an organ of the Morris Party. It is as we said recently a case of Satan reproving sin.

Again he unwittingly adduces further evidence that he is reproving us for doing what he himself did some three and a half years ago. He republished last night a letter he published in April, 1909, which refers to a proposal to establish a newspaper in Bonavista at that time.

The political tide is running heavily against the Morris Party. All round the Island the sentiment of the people is against the Government. People have had enough of Morris and his Government, and what they want is a chance to turn them out.

Fishermen generally hoped that a chance would be afforded them during the fall of this year. Thousands of them petitioned for an opportunity to record their sentiment. But Sir Edward Morris would have none of it. He turned down the petition and made it clear that he intended to hold on as long as he could. He and his colleagues were going to take no chances this fall. He knew what to expect if he held a General Election, and determined to hold on another year.

against hope for a change before the polls are held next fall. Members of the party know the case is hopeless. They recognize they would have no "show" at present, but McEwen-like, they are hoping for a change. But by their refusal to assent to the wishes of the fishermen, they have exasperated them more. The fishermen are resenting the treatment accorded to their petitions. The refusal has strengthened the determination of the fishermen to oust Morris at the coming election, and oust him they will.

Sir Edward Morris has not lived up to his promises. Fishermen, farmers, laborers, clerks and all who work for a living have not found a place under his standard, where they can work for the common weal.

The reduction of taxation has not been brought about. Tea, sugar, pork and other prime necessities of life have not been placed on the free list. Our local coal areas and peat beds have not been developed. Coal has not been cheapened.

Bait freezers have not been established at points round the coast, easily accessible to fishermen so that at all times they might be able to carry on their industry successfully.

The expenditure has been enormous. Money is being spent extravagantly. Fat contracts have been made; great fees paid, numerous offices created; grants of timber limits have been many and extraordinary in size. Supporters have done well but the people generally who work for a living have been burdened with it all, and they are now appalled at the high cost of living and are insistent on a change and they have made up their mind that Morris and his graballs must go.

### Cable News.

TORONTO, To-day.

Among the many volunteer suggestions to be considered by the Union Commission of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church at its sitting now in progress, is one that a doctrinal statement of the union basis should recognize the teaching of the Scripture regarding the person of Satan, should also contain an article safeguarding simplicity of Public Worship. Another writer wants the position of the Protestant Union Church with reference to Roman Catholic Church defined, provision made for the instruction of children as to real meaning of word Roman Catholicism. Some officials think basis does not give adequate pronouncement on the question of Public Worship and Marriage.

LONDON, To-day.

The Greek, Serbian and Montenegrin Peace Commissions have arrived at London. They were greeted at Charing Cross Station by a cosmopolitan crowd, which included members of various Legations. The Greek Premier, M. Venizelos, and other delegates express appreciation of their indebtedness to the British government's courtesy and an earnest hope of a speedy and successful conclusion of their mission. M. Venizelos said they were determined to do their utmost to secure lasting peace and desired hereafter to be best friends with Turks. Sir Edward Grey will attend the opening meeting and make short speech of welcome.

PARIS, To-day.

The first actual political step, looking towards the choice of the next President of French will be taken at a meeting of Republican group in the Chamber of Deputies on January 17 of the members of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies at a meeting of the National Assembly at Versailles they will choose a successor to President Fallieres.

LONDON, To-day.

The Home Rule Bill the Government intends to pass through the Commons before Parliament rises. Prior to March 30 three important bills, Home Rule, Disestablishment of the Church in Wales and the reform of the Franchise, the principal clause of which aims at putting an end to plural voting.

DEVONPORT, To-day.

The steamer run down and sunk by the British Battleship, Centurion, in the English Channel was, as has now been almost certainly established, The Merna whose crew consisted probably of 25 men. She belonged to Genoa.

PEKING, To-day.

The Y.M.C.A. Sixth Triennial World Convention which opened here last night aroused widespread interest. Representatives of all important organizations are scheduled to deliver addresses during the sessions.

HAZLETON, Penn., To-day.

Twenty five hundred mine workers on strike since last Friday, colliers of Lehigh Wilkesbarre coal company voted to return to work, pending settlement of their grievance by the Conciliation Board.

### Women are to Blame

FOR A MAJORITY OF THE MATRIMONIAL TANGLES.

So Says Well Known Boston Matron in Interview—What All Women Will Find of Interest and Value.

"Seventy-five per cent. of all unhappy marriages are unhappy through the wife's fault."

Mrs. Edward W. Hooke, by twenty-four years of uninterrupted marriage, has established her right to one of the proudest degrees of womanhood—W. (happy wife). Meeting her at clubs, at teas, at matinees, in the gymnasium, in any of the score of places where smart women congregate, one hears first that she is a young woman of active mind, with marked executive ability, shown by her capable performance of the duties of president of the International Pure Milk League. But while one woman is admiring her trim tailored suit and another observing that she has travelled so much and lived in so many of the large cities of this country that she is what the politicians call "a good mixer," she thinks it is easy to get along with one's husband.

Mrs. Hooke whisked into a New York tearoom for bathing space in a busy day, and I asked her if she agreed with the trend of modern thought, that marriage is a hard job which the far-sighted woman declines to undertake.

"Bosh!" was Mrs. Hooke's brisk answer. "It is the easiest thing in the world to make one's marriage a happy one, and a man is the easiest thing to manage. All one has to do is to bring it down to the basis of business proposition."

Wives to Blame.

"You are not advocating the American idea of marriage for money, I implied."

"I promise you not to do that, for don't believe in it. But the difficulty that come up in marriage can be settled as they are in a business partnership. If two business partners disagree about something they don't think at once of business dissolution. They argue the matter out earnestly, but not offensively, and reach a bad road of understanding on the essential points. This is what the reasonable wife does."

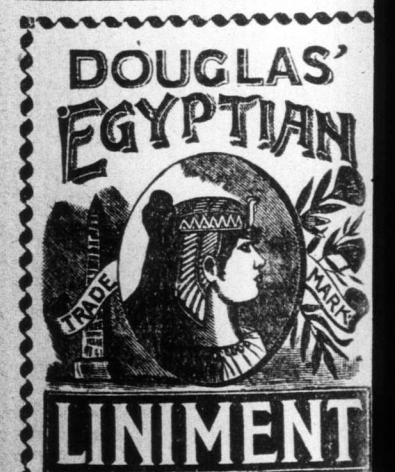
"Are not all wives reasonable?" "Far from it. Seventy-five per cent. of all the unhappy marriages are made unhappy by the wives. Three-fourths of the separations and divorces could be prevented if the women did their share in the business partnership."

"The greatest fault of women in married life is their extravagance. Yes, I know about the women who work hard in their homes and bring up well a large brood of little ones. But with all their virtues of patience and loyalty many of them have the great marital fault of women. Perhaps they don't go down town and buy a dress they know they can't afford. And maybe they don't insist upon living in an exclusive locality, or a gayish apartment house, when they would be better off in an old-fashioned street."

Chloroform Conscience.

"But they do use poor judgment which is a form of extravagance, in buying food. Delicatessens flourish and their owners grow rich because women make them the mainstay of the household instead of the emergency stations they are intended to be. I haven't been inside a delicatessen once in two years, because the household machinery hasn't broken down but once. That is what delicatessens were started for, but careless housekeepers have made them the family supply stations."

"I know a professional man who showed me his books to let me see what a profitable month he had. He closed the books with a bang and asked me not to tell his wife how much he had made. If you did so, would go down to the shops and spend every cent of it before night," he said. At the time I thought he was hars.
