> LOOKS LIKE MUTINY. BOSTON MASS., Oct. 14.

Death of Captain and Mate of the British schooner Onato and abandonment of vessel at sea were reported in wireless message, picked up at naval Radio stations to-day. The massages which came from the American steamer Sarcoxie, indicated that other members of the crew were taken off by arrival in New York from Rotterdam. not disclosed. Request for police boat lead to suggestion that they might have been killed in mutiny. Messages did not say what caused abandonment about 300 miles east of St. John's land. It is supposed she was return-ing to a Newfoundland port.
