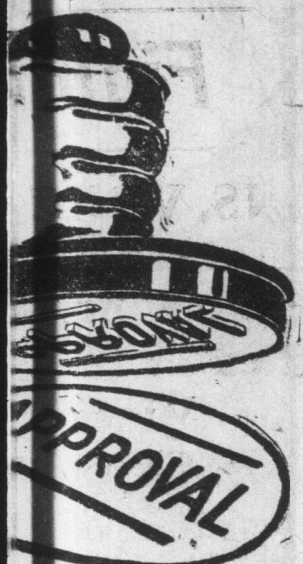

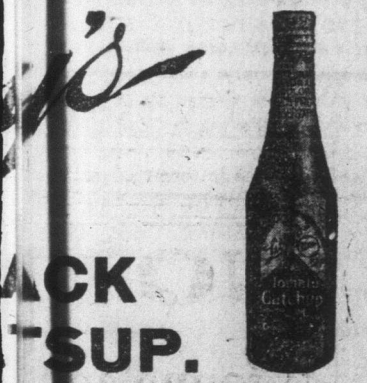

## VICTORY MESSAGES.

### "The Fighting Trio."

HIGGINS, VINICOMBE & FOX.

"Mines" Meeting at Bell Island Un-  
rivalled in Its Political History  
-- The Miners Determined to  
Support Cashin for Greater Pro-  
gress and Prosperity.

RAST WARANA, Monday Night.

The largest and most successful  
political meeting ever held here was  
the one by Higgins, Vinicombe and  
Fox in the Church Lady's Brigade  
spacious armory to-night. Enthusi-  
asm was at a high pitch when Mr.  
Stephen Blackmore, the chairman,  
introduced the Fighting Trio as the  
representatives of the Liberal Pro-  
gressive Party under the leadership  
of Sir Michael Cashin. Their speech-  
es were full of fervour and breathed  
of that optimism significant of those  
who know their cause is right. The  
honest, clean-cut and fearless policy  
of the Fishermen-Progressive met the  
full approval of the large audience.  
The speakers by their appeal to the  
reason and intelligence of the meet-  
ing, instead of to their passions and  
prejudice, which appears to be the  
tactics of the Coaker-Squires oppo-  
sition made a great impression. The  
meeting closed with loud and prolonged  
cheers for Higgins, Vinicombe  
and Fox, and they can be assured that  
they will receive not one vote less  
than 80 per cent of the number cast  
on Polling Day, as the residents here  
know that their interests have been  
served faithfully and well by the  
Hon. Mr. Higgins. Bell Island cannot  
afford to take chances on stag-  
nating with Coaker and Squires and

it is quite apparent that with Cashin  
and the Liberal Progressive Party it

To-night the big rally will be held at  
Lance Cove, which completes the

they faked it. The air was so chilly  
that "the Funky Trio" left again  
Sunday afternoon unwept, unhonored  
and unsung. Mr. Higgins' action in  
offering to have a joint meeting is  
much commented upon here as it  
shows just how much faith he has in  
our intelligence and reason. The  
popularity of him and his candidates  
has increased fifty-fold. The people  
of St. John's can rely upon Bell Is-  
land going solid to the backbone for  
the Liberal Progressive Party.

FLIGHT TO AUSTRALIA.

ISSY LES MOULINEAUX.

France, Oct. 14.

Ariator Poulet started at seven  
fourteen o'clock this morning on his  
flight to Australia. He was sighted  
over Troyes at nine o'clock.

LOOKS LIKE MUTINY.

BOSTON MASS, Oct. 14.

Death of Captain and Mate of the  
British schooner Onato and abandon-  
ment of vessel at sea were reported in  
wireless message, picked up at naval  
Radio stations to-day. The messages  
which came from the American steam-  
er Sarcoz, indicated that other mem-  
bers of the crew were taken off by  
steamer last Thursday and asked that  
police meet the Sarcoz on her  
arrival in New York from Rotterdam.  
How Captain and mate met death is  
not disclosed. Request for police boat  
lead to suggestion that they might  
have been killed in mutiny. Messages  
did not say what caused abandonment  
of schooner. Position where the crew  
were taken off was given as latitude  
47.42 north, longitude 23.45 west or  
about 300 miles east of St. John's  
Newfoundland. The Onato a 106 ton  
schooner arrived at Oporto, Portugal  
on August 23 from Burnt, Newfound-  
land. It is supposed she was return-  
ing to a Newfoundland port.
