Damon's Broken Heart.

motor power succeeded the horse-drawn apparatus of the fire department, bolted from the garage wagon, dragging his mate with him, dashed to the nearest engine house, plunged head foremost into the brick wall, crumpled down in a heap and died.

And the firemen declare that Jack Gallup, humiliated by the transfer from his former post of duty to that of hauling garbage, deliberately committed suicide rather than face the new condition. This calls to memory an incident of back in about the year 1913 in Miami when Henry Chase was chief of the fire department and motor-driven apparatus was installed to take the place of horses. Among the equine beauties of the station was

"Damon," a coal black horse, who had been in the service eight years and possessed almost human intelligence. Damon was sent to the city barns and placed in a yard around which was a wooden fence. The first alarm of fire which sounded created a scene in the animal stockade, and out of the excitement Damon was seen crashing through the wooden fence and then

speeding on lightning hoofs toward the fire station. Arriving there, the proud beauty went direct to the place where it had been his custom to be hitched to the engine, and whinnied because the engine was not there and the harness was not at hand to be adjusted. This act of fidelity brought tears to the eyes of the firemen who had remained on duty at the station, and reluctantly they led Damon back to the stockade.

Damon seemed to realize the transformation in fire department affairs, but his heart was broken. He refused food and water, and in two weeks he died in his stable, although not ill even a day. And reading the stories of these two fire horses one understands the meaning of the expression—"horse sense." May it not be the sense of unwillingness to do less than the possible best, preferring extermination to humiliation?

Lost Islands.

Some currency has been given to a rumour from Santiago that Easter Island has disappeared. The most isolated island on the globe, Easter Island is 2,650 miles from the nearest mainland. It is a triangle in shape with sides 9 by 9 by 13 miles, and its cliffs rise 2,000 feet from an almost tideless sea.

A large mouthful, in truth, for old Ocean to swallow in sudden fashion! But there are various cases on record in which a whole island has dropped from sight.

Falcon Island, near the Tongas, was first seen in 1885, but no sooner had the map makers settled its position than it bobbed out of sight beneath the waves. Yet its cliffs were at least 150 feet high. In 1898 it rose again, steaming hot, but since that date it has again disappeared.

Then there was Bermeja, a good sized islet in the southern part of the Gulf of Mexico. It was no upstart like Falcon Island, but had been in existence for many years. In 1901 a cruiser engaged in charting could find no sign of the island. There was not even a reef left.

In 1841 Captain Dougherty reported an island about half way between New Zealand and Cape Horn, a great rocky ridge 800 feet high and 7 miles long. Twenty years later the island was described for a second time by Captain Keates.

In the present century the Discovery sailed right over the spot formerly occupied by this island. What is more, soundings revealed a depth of 2,000 fathoms, or nearly three miles.

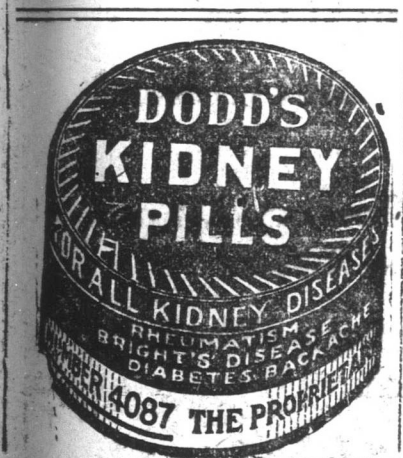
Melita is another Pacific island which vanished in similarly mysterious fashion. In 1880 it was a great mass of rock, at least 150 feet high, but 20

years later nothing of it remained above the surface of the sea. In charts of thirty years ago you will find a group of five red specks to the south of Australia, named the Royal Company Islands. Their exact position was lat. 50.20 S., long. 143.00E. In 1900 S.S. Matatus passed right over this spot and found no trace of them, so the Admiralty has expunged them from its charts.
