Municipal Council**WEEKLY MEETING.**

The weekly meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councillors Martin, Outebridge, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present.

Following Council's protest against Department of Public Works erecting a Coal Weighing Machine on the Asylum Road near Bowring Park, which protest was also forwarded the Government, the Colonial Secretary stated he had taken up the matter with the Minister of Public Works and that same would receive the consideration of the Executive.

Mr. W. E. Stirling wrote re the condition of the Southside Road, west of the Long Bridge, which he stated was almost impassable for pedestrians owing to the very heavy traffic from the Quarry to the Dry Dock. The City Engineer is to take up the matter with the Company with a view of remedying the cause of complaint.

The communication of Mr. W. Way, Atlantic Avenue, re surface drains and street numbering, was referred to the City Engineer.

The Committee appointed to consider suggestions contained in communication of the Deputy Minister of Public Works, which was read at last meeting, for improvement of the surroundings of the National War Memorial, King's Beach, submitted their report which was sanctioned by the full Board. It was decided to forward same to the Department of Public Works, and also a copy of the plan submitted by the City Engineer, showing the proposed improvements, pathways, etc.

The following plans were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer at whose office permits may be obtained on application:—Dwelling, P. Murphy, Brine Street; Garage, P. White, Field Street, conditional upon ventilator being installed.

With reading of Reports of the City Engineer, Sanitary Supervisor, etc., and the granting of requisitions, passing of weekly accounts and other routine business, the meeting adjourned.

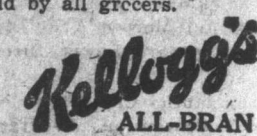

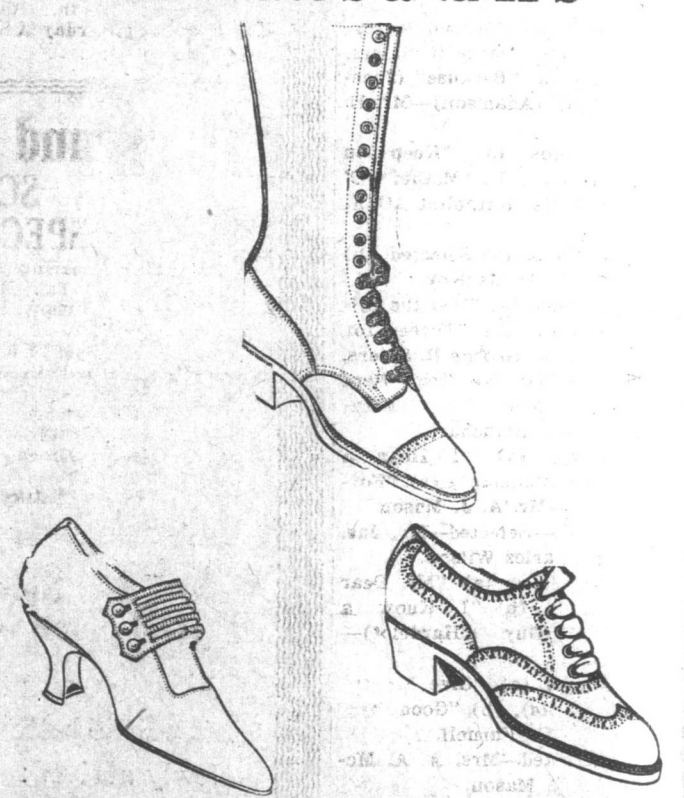
