

**Reciprocity Question.**

Mr. Beaman's bill re-establish reciprocity has received the approval of the Detroit Board of Trade, and has also taken steps to secure co-operation of similar bodies in Chicago, Milwaukee, Toledo, Cleveland and other places. The *Times* of this city urges the movement of the commercial interests of the Atlantic cities, and expresses hope that public opinion will be brought to bear upon Congress. There is, confessedly, no hope of this session. But in December the Ways and Means Committee enter upon the consideration of a tariff; and when that question is decided, we may hope for a fair hearing for reciprocity, especially if the business community meanwhile make themselves heard. Reciprocity will be had unless outside pressure is exerted in its behalf. And the proper and effective pressure is which proceeds from the classes are directly cognizant of the work of the former treaty and the cost and embarrassment of the present system. The *Montreal Gazette*, in this connection, mentions a circumstance which shows the sincere desire of Canada to accept any reasonable terms. Governor-General, our contemporary states, "was empowered by Parliament at its last session to allow in on a Reciprocity basis by an act in Council, so that an arrangement having the effect if not the force of the old treaty, may go into operation this summer if congress be so disposed. **International Copyright.**  
mentioned a few days ago that a bill of copyright had been carried to the House of Lords for decision. The case is chiefly this:—Miss Cummings, a native of the United States, went to Canada, while residing there, her work "The Heart" was published in England. Copyright was claimed, and the author's prosecution for the violation of the law was carried on by the other law. The questions to be determined: 1. In order to obtain a title to copyright must publication take place? 2. In the area over which this copyright extends? 3. Who is entitled to the protection of this copyright? In answer to these questions, Lord Cairns said: "It is clear that to obtain the benefit of the act the publication must take place in the United Kingdom. Section 1, I have no doubt that the area over which the protection extends is the whole of the British dominions. Thirdly, the most important, I hold that the author who publishes in the United Kingdom is entitled to the protection of copyright, whosoever he may be, and to what sovereign power he may be subject. The aim of the legislation was to increase the stock of literature, and he is entitled in return to the benefit of this act."

**ARMY TAKEN FROM FENIANS.**—Eight tons of arms, taken from the Fenians by the United States Government, passed through Burlington, Vermont, on Wednesday afternoon by the National Express en route from St. Albans to New York.

**Latest Gossip from Ottawa.**  
Insurance Companies are preparing to conform to the new law by paying the tax. The British America, Toronto, does so. It is not yet known whether the Life or Life companies will withdraw business in this country. The impression is general among the conservatives that Mr. Howland's place in the Cabinet will be filled by one of the party. The Cabinet meeting on Thursday, was present, except Mr. Rose who has returned to England. No deaths have occurred at Ottawa since the excessive heat. Attorney General Oulmet, of the Province of Quebec, is said to have resigned. Mr. Chauveau declined to give Queen's printership to M. Duvernay, remembering desiring it for Mr. Evanturel.

**UNION FOREST FAIR.**—The prices at the fair held in Mount Forest were for ordinary cattle, although good ones were paid for fat beasts. Prices for oxen \$70 to \$80, cows \$18 to \$20 and heifers \$12 to \$16.  
**LETTERS DISSATISFIED.**—The *Montreal Gazette* complains that the Quebec Government lack decision—that its members constantly in a state of disagreement on matters of public importance—influenced by petty considerations, jealousies, and rival nationalities, have failed to select a Queen's Printer, and to make other appointments demanded by the exigencies of the service of the Province. The *Gazette* estimates that it might contribute to the best interests of the Province if the present Ministry would retire and a different set of men attempt to assume the reins of government, and take charge of the Provincial

Mr. Bright was entertained at a public breakfast at the Philharmonic Hall, in Liverpool, on the 4th inst., by the Liberal Association of that town, at least seven hundred people being present, besides many ladies. He made a speech reviewing the course of legislation for the last twenty-five years, touching upon the repeal of the Corn laws, the treaty with France, the war with Russia and the Irish Church and Land questions. In the course of his remarks he said: "I consider that the removal of the taxes upon newspapers—the advertisement, stamp and paper duties—one of the greatest triumphs and blessings achieved in our time. It is a measure for which we are indebted very much more than to any other member of the present House of Commons to my hon. friend Mr. Milner Gibson. (Cheers) Has there in our time—within any time in England—been a measure carried by Parliament which has so largely promoted education and instruction as that? Take this very country, during the last seven years, when so much suffering existed during the cotton famine. Every man and every woman in my end of the country, was informed of the cause of the distress; and when men are told the cause of their suffering, when they know that it has not been brought about intentionally, not by any injustice of other men, they learn to be patient, and they abstain from that anger and that violence which suffering naturally promotes among a population. (Hearty hear.) I believe that during that period we were very much indebted to the newspapers which are now so cheap and universal. What did the opponents of that measure say? They—*The Times* and other papers—said that the penny papers would be made up of paragraphs and leaders taken from the dear papers. Now, I believe that the penny papers write just as good leaders as the dear papers. They said further, that we should have a newspaper press that would be immoral, that would be slanderous, that would be libelous, and that whereas, nothing is more clear and more universally admitted than that the character of the newspaper press in all these things has been gaining and improving for many years past, and that at this moment there is nothing whatever to be said in favor of a dear ancient press over the cheap newspapers brought into life by the abolition of the taxes upon newspapers. I charge upon Mr. Disraeli and his friends that they are fermenters of discord in this kingdom—that they are endeavoring to set up again those cries out of which come some of the greatest evils which which nations can be afflicted. The 'No Popery' cry was a cry of great power in days far past. Whether its power is totally gone we shall have an opportunity of seeing within the next six months. I am happy to believe that one of the great blessings of the cheap, and universal, and honorably written newspaper press, will be found to be that that cry now will have lost its power, and that we shall find that the intellect, thought, and civilization and sense of justice, and morality and of true Christianity of the people of the Kingdom, will rise superior to that cry, will wholly disregard it, and will suppress the pretensions to power of the Ministry and party who have sought to use it.
