He played on the Farmington Athletic Club's team, and the game was with the Yale seniors. The accident happened during a scrimmage, when White had the ball and fell underneath. His head was jammed down so that a serious injury to the spine was caused, resulting in paralysis. He was helpless up to his death.

BOWLING. An Association football match was played Thursday on the grounds of the Michigan Athletic Association in Detroit, between the Windsor, champions of Western Ontario, and the M. A. A. team, of Detroit, resulting in each team scoring two goals.

DEATHS. Mr. Joseph Gilbert, the oldest bowler in Scotland, died in Cupar the other day, at the venerable age of 97.

B. A. Brodie, the champion of New Zealand, is only 10 years of age. Among his opponents on a recent tour were several ladies, one of whom, Miss Maggie Leitch, drew a well-played game from the "Ayrshire Lassie" opening.

Mr. William Houston, an old Glasgow player, has won the first prize in a solution tournament at Melbourne, Australia, with the fine score of 114 points out of a possible 120. The contest extended over six months.

CESS. PHENOMENAL PLAY. QUEBEC, Dec. 1.—Her Steinitz, the chess champion, played seventeen simultaneous games last evening. At midnight he had won six, and the balance were in progress. In the afternoon he played two consultation games, four players at each board, winning both.

In cleaning the Goddess of Liberty the other day, which is poised on the highest pinnacle of the Texas State Capitol, a local paper says it was discovered that a swarm of bees had made their home in the hollow head of the goddess, using the nostrils as an entrance, and had filled it half full of honey. Two Baroness Burdett-Coutts has endowed not fewer than three Protestant Episcopal bishoprics. They are those of Cape Town, South Africa, Adelaide, South Australia and British Columbia. In addition to this she has given \$250,000 to the University of British Columbia, while \$450,000 was expended in the construction of St. Stephen's Church, Westminster, in memory of her father. Three other metropolitan churches were built by her, and yet this is

but a small portion of the money she has given to charity and benevolence.

BACTERIA are likely to be blamed for all the ills that flesh is heir to. Prof. Schenck now maintains that what we call a "cold" is really due to these invisible pests. When one enters a cold room after being heated the bacteria in it flock to the warm body and enter by the open pores of the skin. Whatever may be said of his hypothesis, he seems to have proved by experiment that bacteria in the neighborhood of a warm body move toward it. The confirmed smoker may derive some comfort from the fact that tobacco is inimical to them.

A TRAVELER in the Himalayan Mountain region has discovered that the natives of that country cultivate a grain hitherto unknown in civilized agricultural operations, which has something the look of wheat but has very much longer ears, and which has a peculiar inward curve. The grain, known as "kharif," unlike wheat, is on the other hand, much smaller than wheat grains should be for so large an ear. But the interest is that a cereal of this character should yield such heavy crops in so high an altitude, where the seasons are necessarily short and the temperature low. The natives call the grain "kharif."

A TOUCHING incident has just occurred at Windsor Castle. An aged and widowed Scotchwoman, Mary Clarke, a resident of Dumfries, feeling herself aggrieved in consequence of having been evicted from her home, determined to lay her case before the Queen. Accompanied by her daughter, 15 years of age, she left the town and walked first to the White Lodge, Richmond, and then to Windsor Castle, where she arrived in a penniless condition, after a week's tramp from the north. Her case was investigated by Acting Inspector Kelsey, of the royal household police, and her immediate necessities having been cared for by some charitable persons at the castle, the poor woman and her daughter left Windsor on their return to Scotland.

LONDON, CANADA.

London and suburbs have a population of 40,000 persons.

London is situated in the garden of Canada, midway between the Niagara and the Detroit Rivers.

London is the center of nine different lines of railway, giving easy access to the whole continent, and to the lakes and seaboard.

London has direct connection with the three great Canadian lines of railway—the Grand Trunk, the Canadian Pacific, and the Michigan Central.

London controls a line of railway from the city to Port Stanley, on Lake Erie.

Each day more trains arrive at and depart from London than arrive at and depart from any other Canadian city in the same time.

London has two public parks.

London has six charitable institutions, two hospitals and seven public buildings.

London has a good street railway, which will be much extended during the year.

London's rate of taxation is 18 mills, which includes all school rates, etc.

London's public water supply is obtained from never-failing pure springs four miles from the city. Their yield is practically unlimited.

London has the best drinking water on the continent.

London is an excellent health resort, as it has a lower death rate than any city of its size on the continent, and it has magnificent white sulphur baths within its limits.

London has 1 opera house and 4 public halls.

London has 13 public schools (and a number are under contract), not including kindergartens; 3 Roman Catholic separate schools, 2 ladies' colleges, and 1 collegiate institute.

London has 1 university and 1 medical school.

London has a Conservatory of Music and a School of Eloquence.

London has two daily newspapers (morning and evening editions).

London has 2 public libraries.

London has six banks and eight loan and investment associations.

London is an excellent center for manufacturing and commercial enterprises. There are already established wholesale houses for groceries, hardware, drygoods, small wares, boots and shoes, drugs, crockery, etc. There are one or more manufacturing establishments, engine, boiler, stove, furnaces, iron and brass foundries, carriage, burial caskets, agricultural implements, stamped tinware, railway cars, clothing, cigars, office and school furniture, biscuits and confectionery, mirrors and beveled plate-glass, corsets, furs, beer, washing compounds, acids, woodwork of every description, etc.

London's civil assets are \$2,547,798.30 and the balance of assets over all liabilities is \$422,861.19. The total assessment is \$15,333,067.

London has 44 churches, every religious denomination of any importance being represented.

London has an excellent Entomological Society and exhibition, and some of the latest entomologists to be found in Canada.

London has markets three times weekly, the best in the west. The Great Western Fair is held for ten days in September.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 1.—A remarkable case was presented to the students of Starling Medical College by Dr. Loving. The patient had been subjected to an operation for pleurisy by a Buffalo physician, and the ribs in front and four in the rear were removed. The left lung was entirely gone; an open cavity extended through the chest. The heart was laid bare, covered only by the pericardium, and could be clearly seen pulsating in its normal activity.
