—Mr. J. W. Jones yesterday afternoon

were fairly good.

—Mrs. Foreman, of Askin street, fell

down the cellar steps at her home Monday

night, but suffered nothing further than

some severe bruises.

—County Constable J. W. Ward was at-

tacked by a cow the other day. The

animal ran its horn against Ward's right

hand and broke a finger.

—The supplemental examination of the
