## FAIR AND COOLER.

Toronto, May 26-11 p.m.—The area  
of depression which was west of the  
lake region on Saturday has passed  
across Ontario, causing showers of  
thunder storms in most localities, and a  
small depression moving north from the  
Atlantic has given rain in Nova Scotia.  
An unusually deep depression covers  
the Canadian Northwest Territories.  
The minimum and maximum tem-  
peratures reported for today are:  
Calgary, 46-66; Edmonton, 48-74; Prince  
Albert, 30-70; Winnipeg, 30-72; Parry  
Sound, 56-74; Toronto, 64-73; Montreal,  
58-74; Quebec, 56-66; Chatham, N. B.,  
52-70; Halifax, 48-52.

for the next 24 hours for the low-  
lake region (covering the penin-  
sula and as far east as Belleville) are:  
Moderate to fresh winds; fair and a  
little colder.

The first picnic of the London West
