Skin-Grafting Case at St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto.

In September last a young woman named Catharine Lawley, of Hamilton, while employed in the laundry at Upper Canada College unfortunately had both arms drawn into a mangle. The results was disastrous. At this juncture, a young man named Hugh O'Connell, who is reputed to be the young lady's lover, came forward and gallantly volunteered to provide enough skin for the second operation. Drs. Young O'Connell is himself in St. Michael's Hospital, and in suffering terrible pain, though it is believed that all will now turn out well. When Miss Lawley first came to the hospital, no hope of saving her arms was entertained.
