TALK OF LICENSE REDUCTION. To a Globe representative Mr. F. S. Spence said yesterday: "I have been quoted as seeming to favor a proposal for reducing the number of liquor licenses now in operation in Toronto. I did not advocate, nor even express, opinion upon such a policy. I definitely refused to make any suggestion as to the line of action which temperance workers ought immediately to take. No one has any right to speak for the temperance party until there has been opportunity for a full discussion of the situation, and consultation as to the best method of securing the best possible results from the magnificent victory won on Thursday last, in which the present liquor system was condemned by a majority greater, I think, than that expected by any friend of the temperance cause. When questioned concerning the effect of license reduction, I pointed out the fact that such action might do good, and yet, under certain circumstances. might have disadvantages, calling attention to the fact that mischief is being done by efforts recently made by the liquor party in Te-ronto to secure the scattering of licenses over a wider area, thus making them more convenient of access to the population at large."
