OIL CASE AGAINST LONDONERS

(Continued From Page One.)

Alleged It Was Useless.

Some time after the arrival of the oil, which came in a two-gallon can, Mr. Crumney made an experiment on his floor, with the result that he found the fluid useless for his purposes.

Under the contract, if the company within forty days that the goods were unsatisfactory, it guaranteed to remove them without expense to the purchaser.

Mr. Crumney, however, did not attempt to notify the oil company that the goods were unsatisfactory until about two months later.

His negligence to do this, he explained, was because the invoice had not arrived until six weeks after the oil was received.

Upon receiving the invoice, he wrote Mr. Powers at the address given, 2079 St. Catherine street, Montreal.

The letter was returned, he said, with the information that no such party lived at the address given.

Regarding a Draft.

At this point of the evidence, Mr. N. Atkinson Oil Company, asked Mr. Crumney whether he had not received a draft for payment in connection with the oil he had ordered.

"I did, and I didn't," was the reply. "A local bank called me up some time ago, and informed me that they had among a number of other drafts for payment to the National Oil Company, one directed to me. The bank people said, 'I don't suppose you will pay this?' and I replied that I certainly would not, as the goods were not as represented."

Mr. Powers Evidence.

Mr. James Powers, when questioned, admitted that the Liberty Drug Oil Company did not manufacturing in New York, and that the company was registered there in the name of his wife.

Judge Elliott asked Mr. Shore if the "English" floor oil was manufactured in England, and was informed that it was not.

His honor then stated that in his opinion the company's method of taking orders was calculated to deceive, and that the defendant should not be compelled to pay for something that was of no use to him.

Confusion of Names.

The confusion of names was most deceiving, and the fact that the term "English" had been used in connection with the floor oil, was further calculated to mislead the unwary purchaser of his goods.

"But, your honor," protested Mr. Shore, "how about your Parisian laundries and French cleaning establishments?"

"Well, a laundry is merely a mechanical business," replied Judge Elliott, "and it does not matter whether a man's shirt is done up by a Chinaman, or a Frenchman, so long as it is done up properly."

Mr. Shore then asked that the several remaining cases on the list be postponed.

This means that they can be brought up at any future time. The request was granted.
