ICE GORGE SMASHES AND MENACES ALLEGHENY

The Ohio River Is On the Rampage and Pittsburg Expects Serious Floods.

Pittsburg, Jan. 19.—Tons upon tons of water are pouring into the Ohio from the Allegheny River where, thirty miles above this city, the ice gorge at Freeport broke last night. The Allegheny, its bank full of soft spongy ice, crumbled into small floes by its tumble over the dam after the gorge let go, is rushing by the city and forcing the Ohio River up at the rate of two feet an hour.

For two months the gorge had been For two months the gorge had been forming at Freeport. Ice fifteen inches thick had piled up fifteen feet high, and as the recent snows on the Allegheny water shed melted with the high temper-atures of the past 48 hours, water was held back until it had reached a depth held back until it had reached a depth of seventeen feet and covered acres of lowland around Freeport. The warm rains had disintegrated the solid ice, and while it was menacing in appearance no dauger was feared. Shipping was secured, however, and the boats were removed from the Allegheny around it to the Monongaliela. No trouble was experienced lost night.


