WHITNEY DEFINES THE EXECUTIVE

Says the Members of the Council Are Advisers of the Crown.

MORE JUDGES FOR ONT.

A Measure Introduced To Give Government a Portion of All New Town Sites.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, March 4.—The Legislature worked faithfully yesterday afternoon, and materially depleted the order paper before they rested from their labors.

A bill providing for the appointment of new judges in Ontario was introduced, but the number was left blank. Another bill introduced allows the Government to retain one-quarter of the lots when town sites are laid out. Sir James Whitney announced that the Government would appoint a commission to investigate conditions and other legislation before revising the workman's compensation act.

Sir James Whitney introduced a bill respecting the executive council. He briefly explained that it was intended to define exactly the status of the members of the executive council. All members of the council were as such advisers of the crown, whether holding portfolios or not, and ranked in the order of appointment. The holding of a portfolio was only incidental, and did not make the holder more a member of the Government or more an adviser of the crown than before receiving the portfolio. Considerable confusion and uncertainty had hitherto existed on the question, and the bill was intended to do away with this condition.

Mr. McDougall (East Ottawa), asked if the bill made it unnecessary for a minister previously without portfolio, to return to his constituency for re-election on receiving a portfolio. Sir James replied that such was not the intention of the bill.

Government Town Sites. Hon. Mr. Cochrane explained that his bill respecting town sites, provided that when the town site was filed, the Government should retain 25 per cent of the land, the minister to select one lot and the owner three lots, and go on in alternate order. Mr. McDougall asked if the application would be limited to waste lands. What would be done about the towns which grew up naturally, he asked. "I never knew one to grow up naturally," answered the minister. "It has to have a plan."

Mr. Gamay believed the principle was a rather extraordinary one. He asked if any other government had introduced a similar bill. He was told that British Columbia had a similar law.

Hon. Mr. Foy pointed out that in the Northwest the Government took half the land. The bill passed its second reading.

Workman's Compensation. Mr. Fraser (Welland), moved the second reading of his bill to amend the workman's compensation act, by placing the onus of proof of negligence on the railways in case of accidents to employees. Mr. Fraser has introduced this bill at previous sessions but it never got beyond the first reading. In voicing the interests of the trainmen, Mr. Fraser said it would be well if some of the roads which were increasing their trackage would spend some money instead in improving their present roadbed and equipment.

Sir James Whitney stated that the Government had decided to have the whole question investigated with a view to securing the benefit of the best legislation passed elsewhere. The Government could then frame new legislation on the subject. He, therefore, asked that the bill be withdrawn, and Mr. Fraser complied with the request. Mr. Brewster (South Brant), had a bill to prevent traction engines from running on paved streets in municipalities. Hon. Mr. Hanna said it would

not be advisable to pass the bill at the present time, and it was withdrawn.

Mr. McPherson (West Toronto), moved his bill to give Toronto power to divide the city into ten instead of seven wards as at present. Mr. Hanna said conditions made the bill necessary, and it was sent on to committee.

Answering Mr. Studholme's question, Hon. Mr. Duff said J. W. Rigby sent six domestics to Ontario in 1909. The Government had their names and home and present addresses.

Mr. Johnston (West Hastings), moved for a return showing what steps the Canadian Northern Ontario Railway had taken towards building into the city belt, in aid of which the House voted last session a subsidy of 4,000 acres of land for every mile constructed on certain conditions, among others that operations be commenced within one year from the passing of the act on April 13, 1909.

Mr. Johnston said he wished to know if the company seriously intended to assist in developing New Ontario. Mr. Gamay said the question of colonizing and opening up the north country was one of the most important before the Government. He said it would be a good business proposition to grant large sums of cash to persons who would develop the country by bringing in immigrants. Some capitalists should be selected, land chosen and colonies started on a large scale. Properly carried out, the scheme would be the biggest thing in the history of the province.

Hon. Dr. Reame said he would furnish later the information asked for by Mr. Johnston.

More Judges. A bill providing for the appointment of new judges at Toronto was introduced by Hon. Mr. Foy. He explained that the judges were paid by the Dominion Government, Ontario contributing only \$1,000 each towards their salaries. The work of the judges was increasing very rapidly, and more judges were needed. He asked the members to ascertain the views of their constituents as to the number of new judges who should be appointed, the number having been left blank in the bill.

Hon. A. G. MacKay suggested that the act come into force on the first of September in order to give the minister of justice sufficient notice. Hon. Mr. Foy said the bill was not necessarily to be brought into force at once, and the minister of justice would be notified in ample time. The new judges were not to be attached to any particular division, but would be judges of the high court, and available for work either in the court of appeal or any divisions of the high court. If any of the judges were ill, a new judge could be called upon to take the work.

The bill to amend the municipal drainage act was explained by Hon. Mr. Hanna. It contained one material alteration. One section made it clear that all drains should be carried to a sufficient outlet, which would not damage lands. The other point is that where damages are caused by a small stream, the referee is given power to state in his report the amount of land which should be included in claims for damages.

MR. NICKLE'S CHARGE ROUSED THE BAKERS

A Lively Scene at the Bread Bill Debate in Committee. Toronto, Ont., March 4.—There were a number of lively scenes in the bread bill debate of the municipal committee yesterday, one of them being precipitated by Mr. Nickle. It is a well-known fact, said Mr. Nickle, "that the bakers have an association, and they can make the price what they like through the association."

"No association; no, no, no," rang out several voices from the long row of bakers, who disliked the allegation. "Well, I want to say that you have, I hold in my hand a copy of the Baker and Confectioners' Association of the Bakers' and Confectioners' Association of the Dominion of Canada. The officers are given as George Watson, Toronto, president; Jas. Ruddy, London, first vice; Harry Dietrich, Berlin, second vice; A. H. Shouldis, Ottawa, third vice; H. E. Trent, Toronto, secretary; A. W. Carrick, Toronto; treasurer. The executive is Z. Hilton, Toronto; H. C. Tomlinson, Toronto; Jas. Waterhouse, Chatham; Herbert Vick, Orillia.

LORDS VETO A LAW OR ASQUITH RESIGNS

Premier Tells Commons That the Life of Cabinet Is Staked on Proposals.

London, March 4.—In the House of Lords yesterday afternoon Lord Lansdowne, the Unionist leader in that body, announced that he and his followers would not oppose the passage by the Lords on March 7 of the two money bills now before the House of Commons. But in regard to the treasury temporary borrowing bill, Lord Lansdowne said they would call attention to the Government's delay in meeting the financial needs of the current year.

In the Commons the Premier said that the budget would be brought up immediately after the resolutions regarding the Lords' power of veto were passed. This does away with the suggestion that two budgets be rolled into one.

Premier Asquith also indorses the attitude of David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, reiterating that the Government would not continue in power unless it was in a position to insure the veto proposal being passed into law.

A CAIRNGORM DOG SUFFERED FROM RABIES

An Examination of the Head at Ottawa Proves This Fact.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Strathroy, March 4.—Dr. E. Brandreth, V.S., has been notified by the department at Ottawa that the head of a dog belonging to W. Bryant, of Cairngorm, Ont., sent to Ottawa on Feb. 24, contained negro bodies, and animals inoculated died violent deaths from rabies. The dog bit at least seven other dogs that are known and are now in quarantine, and it is believed bit a number of others also.

RABIES ARE FOUND IN EVERY HEAD

All Reports Sent to Dr. Tennent Are Hopeful for the Worst.

Dr. J. H. Tennent, Dominion Government inspector, was notified last night that a dog's head sent to Ottawa some days ago by R. J. Shine, veterinary, of West Moncton, in Perth County, contained negro bodies, and that animals inoculated died of rabies. This dog bit a number of other dogs before it was killed.

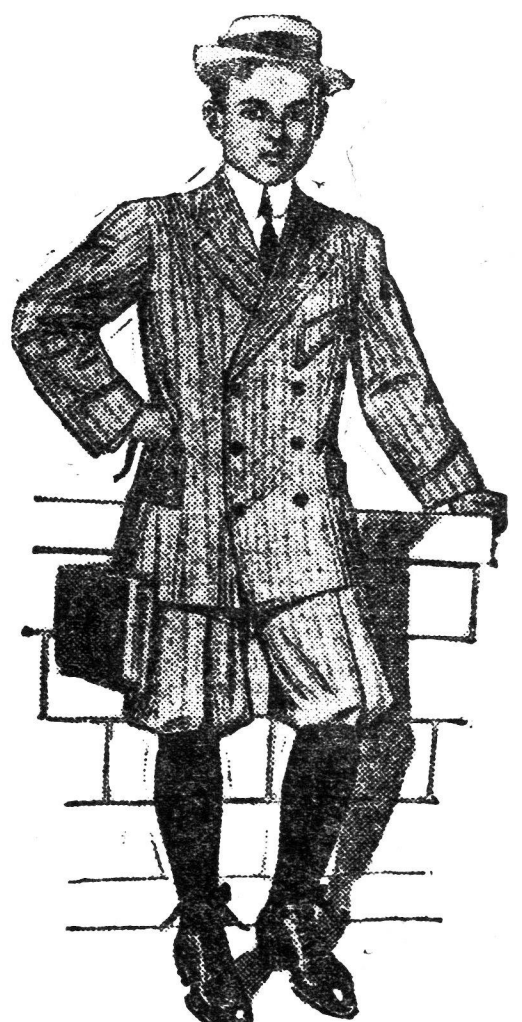
