GAYNOR MAY RUN

But Will Not Be an Active Candidate For New York Governorship.

New York, Sept. 6.—Mayor Gaynor will not be an active candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor of the state, but the New York Times says more than one of the alleged legislative bodies in our country have gone on the great principle—a principle that should ever bulk large: "Canada for the Canadians."

These words were contained in the report of the legislative committee of the Life Underwriters' Association of Canada, which report was presented at the opening session of the fourth annual convention of the association in this city this afternoon by ex-President John Reid, Ottawa, chairman of the committee.

The report made reference to the insurance investigation by the royal commission, appointed through the instrumentality of Hon. W. S. Fielding, about four years ago.

"As a result," the report stated, "the public were given assurance that the interests of the policy-holders in Canadian companies were amply safeguarded."

With reference to the finding of the commission, Mr. Reid said, "It might be the wisest course not to be severely critical of the conduct of the inquiry, or the final deliverance of the royal commission. Looked at from a Canadian standpoint, one is at a loss to understand the attitude of the commissioners in acting as servile imitators of the Armstrong bill. As a Canadian I want to state that upon the whole I am proud of the business and social civilization of our country. It is only fair to state that a good example for the people was set by the able handling of the matters by the minister of finance."

"I think Canada can now boast of the best insurance law in the whole world," added Mr. Reid. He urged the insurance men to loyally obey the law.

THE VEGETABLE GROWERS

Many Noted Experts to Address Convention Here on 14th.

Mayor Beattie will address the Ontario Vegetable Growers in convention on the 14th of the month, opening the evening session.

Professor Myers, of the Pennsylvania State College, will give an illustrated address on experiments with cabbage, tomatoes, asparagus, greenhouse men and gardeners should attend every session, beginning at 9 a.m. in the city hall.

"Irrigation in Garden and Greenhouse," W. H. Coles, Troy, Ohio, will be of special interest to all gardeners.

A large attendance is anticipated. J. Lockie Wilson, Toronto, secretary-treasurer, will tell the convention what he saw in vegetable growing countries of the old world.

THE BEGGAR HOST

A PEST IN NEW YORK

Tramps, Both Professional and Amateur, Descend on the District in Droves.

New York, Sept. 5.—Tramps, professional and amateur, and trespassers of both sexes and all ages are simply swarming over the upper section of the city, forming a very serious problem for the police. When Police Commissioner McAdoo went out to one of the beggar squad which he established along for catching thieves and confidence men. The beggars became more bold, and now the residents of the upper section of the city are in arms. They will appeal to the Police Commissioner Baker to rid them of this annoyance. The railroads report a very noticeable increase in vagrancy on their lines. Stealing food, stealing rides, stealing hand-trucks, threatening and insulting trainmen, placing obstructions on the tracks, stoning freight crews, and setting air brakes are typical offenses.

The hoboes who are swarming the upper section of the city, particularly in Harlem, are bold and threaten all who fail to give them alms or food. In 126th street, between Lenox and Seventh avenues, the residents are furious. There the hoboes, who are on each side of the street, are making a quick departure, when informed the police were coming, went away. He had hardly gone when a big strapping man appeared and demanded 50 cents. When he failed to get the money he wished the occupant of the house all kinds of hard luck.

"I hope your old home burns down with you and all your children," was his parting word. During the summer the residents in Harlem, those who had not closed their homes, would sit on their front door stoops and beg for alms. Along would come the army of beggars pleading for alms. One young man who was visiting friends was sitting on the stoop of a house with his friends. An old man, dressed in a shabby, threadbare suit, came up to him and said, "Say, mister, have you got an extra pair of trousers?" he said addressing the young man.

"No," replied the young man, "only what I have on."

"Well, take them off," said the beggar, "and get yer friends to fix yer up. I got to have a pair to work in to-morrow. This pain," pointing to the breeches he had on, "are all in tatters."

At last the old man was sent away, but before long another appeared on the scene and begged for a few cents to get something to eat. Early each morning the beggars make their appearance in Harlem. They ring the basement door bells sometimes as early as 6 o'clock. If they fail to get a good breakfast they become abusive. Besides the beggars, men from various societies come around collecting old clothes, books and magazines. They come three or four times a day.

A man in rags and with an apparently open face, came up to a house in 126th street a few nights ago. "Can you give me something to eat?" he asked.

"Why can't you get work?" asked a man who came to the door.

"You give me a meal and I'll tell you all about it."

The man took the tramp at his word.

"That was a good meal, and I feel better than a 3-year-old," said the panhandler. "Now for my story. I've had good jobs—some of the best in New York, Boston, Chicago, and other cities. I don't know what to call it, disease, or mania, but I have to go on the road and I cannot control it. First I got to drinking. I can leave the stuff alone for five or six months at a time, but that seems to be my limit."

"So far as the hoboes are concerned when so many men are out of work as at the present time it is a tough game. A man in the bread line at Fleischmann's gets there an hour or two ahead of time nowadays, and if he is downright starved three hours ahead. After he gets it he walks up to the Bowers Mission to get another hand-out. He gets the morning paper about 2 a.m., and looks for a job. If the job is uptown by the time he reaches there he finds a hundred ahead of him. There is a good reason why the employer shows up. It's 100 to 1 he don't land the job, for his clothes are against him. Still he tells his story and gets the answer, 'We've heard that before. You drink. That's why you're down and out. Nothing doing.'"

"After a week of this sort of thing a man becomes discouraged and won't look for work. He begs and makes enough money and gets enough clothes and food to keep him alive. He is a real son of rest. He keeps on working Fleischmann's and the mission. Occasionally he takes a drink. He says, 'There are different kinds of tramps as I know them. There is the gay, a sort of fellow who follows the crops around the hay, hops, potatoes, grapes, and apples. He makes lots of good friends on the road, who expect him back next season.'

"The piker is a man who will walk from ten to fifteen miles a day. No work for him as he knows every jail or poughie (poorhouse) on the line."

"The musher, the fellow who mends umbrellas and boilers, makes a good living, but is always drunk."

"The word hobo comes from Ohio, where the farmers call 'hey, boy' to the farm help. A tramp was going out the gate when the mistress called him back, shouting 'ho bo.'

"The worst kind of a tramp is the Bible stuffer who goes up for any kind of religion or sect he goes up against. He carries a small Bible and knows every chapter."

"There is the blanket stiff of California. He carries his own blanket and does his own cooking."

The beggars in order to arouse sympathy fix up their limbs in bandages. They do this so well that it completely fools the good Samaritan."

The business places are also annoyed by beggars. The cafes on West 125th street have at least fifty tramps, beggars, and peddlers enter their places during the day. They go out one door and come in another. They never fail to pass the free lunch counter and stuff their pockets. Old women sell shoe laces, collar buttons, matches, and pens. There are several blind men who have small boys to lead them in and out of the saloons. They pay these boys 50 cents a day. Women from religious societies carrying small tin boxes are always to be seen.
