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GOVT. ASSURED OF A LIVELY TIME

Bombardment of Vital Questions Will Come From Opposition Members.

CENSURE COL. HUGHES

Borden Will Be Asked To Explain Minister's Wild Statement in Regard to Germany.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—Only three score inquiries of the ministry by private members on matters of both parol and national interest are already on the order paper. The inquisitiveness of the members covers a large range of subjects, and some questions bristle with embarrassment for the Government.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux will ask Premier Borden for a statement as to the truth of Armand Lavergne's recent declaration that he was offered a place in the cabinet, and that he had much to do with the choice of Mr. Borden's Quebec ministers. Mr. Lemieux also wants to know as to the truth of Mr. Lavergne's statement that the Premier gave Mr. Monk assurance when the cabinet was formed, that a plebiscite would be taken before any kind of contribution to the British navy was decided by the Government. Mr. Lemieux further inquires as to the authority which Col. Sam Hughes had for declaring at Vancouver last August that Germany had to be taught a lesson, and that Canada must join with Great Britain to help teach that lesson. Other queries from the ex-postmaster-general concern the extent to which the axe has been wielded by Hon. L. F. Peltier and the latter's intentions with regard to a parcel-post system.

Hon. Charles Murphy asks what the Government is going to do about the Georgian Bay Canal this session, and how many special commissioners have been appointed, and how much money has been paid them since the present Government assumed office.

Mr. Sinclair, of Guyshere, asks information as to the new private cars purchased for the ministers, and as to the delay in carrying out the construction of promised branch lines of the Intercolonial.

There are also numerous questions as to dismissals, appointments, etc., in various constituencies.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson has given notice of a resolution declaring that, in view of the general feeling throughout Canada that express rates are intolerably high, the railway commission should make a thorough investigation of the whole question of express rates, covering the dividends earned by the companies for the past ten years, with a view to remedying conditions now complained of.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, ex-postmaster-general, will bring the question of a Canadian parcel-post system before Parliament by moving a resolution declaring that such a system should be established in the interests of the public.

SNATCHED FROM DEATH

Crew of American Schooner Has Terrific Experiences Off British Columbia Coast.

 Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 21.—Five days and nights without sleep, three days without water to drink, wet to the skin during the whole of that period on a helpless, waterlogged, dismantled schooner, and then, when hope had been abandoned, and the crew crowded into the little remaining small boat, with huge seas carrying them on to the rugged shores of Vancouver Island, the welcome smoke of the Canadian fisheries cutter, William Joffe appeared and nine sailors were snatched from the jaws of death.

This was the experience of the crew of the American schooner E. K. Wood, whose members arrived here this morning. The schooner lies an abandoned wreck on Vancouver Island. She had a cargo of lumber out of Bellingham, Wash., bound for San Pedro, California, and sailed Nov. 9.

TO REMOVE CATTLE EMBARGO.
 London, Nov. 21.—An influential deputation waited on Premier Asquith in the House of Commons this evening on the question of the embargo of store cattle at British ports. The premier promised that in conjunction with the president of the board of agriculture he would consider all the points raised, with a view to removal of the restrictions at the earliest possible date.

A member of the deputation states that it is expected the embargo will be removed within the next month.

PARIS SEERESS SEES BAD YEAR

Predicts All Kinds of Disasters for the World During the Year 1913.

MORE WAR AND TURMOIL

Year of Blood and Great Fires, a New King, a New Pope, and Germany at War.

Paris, Nov. 21.—It was Mme. de Thebes who last November predicted a war in the Balkans, an epidemic, and other strange things. Many have come true. Raoul Aubry, of the Temps, has had a talk with the seeress in relation to her predictions for the coming year, to be soon published.

"In 1911," he says, "Mme. de Thebes, referring to 1912, called it the black year. Now her visions help her to predict that 1913 will be what she terms the aurora year, or a year which will be a prelude to noble awakenings, leading to the highest summits, but a year also of grave perils, which only those of superhuman courage can pass through successfully, for 1913 will be a year of blood and this old world of ours will crack, figuratively speaking, I suppose."

Also the number thirteen is often fatal. In this instance, 1913, she sees the birth of an extraordinary influence, women bending over the wounded. Even beyond the frontier Paris has a special prescient moment. Events of the most tragic nature are predicted. The theatre and music will play an important part in civic life. There will be great tumult. Unprecedented theatrical spectacles will be witnessed. One man will give his entire fortune and surround Paris, thinking to surround the world. There will be many fires. Actors, actresses and sportsmen will suffer, in fact, Mme. de Thebes sees Paris sublime and appalling. A foreign army will be at the frontier and the country in danger.

"Her picture of other countries is no better. She sees a new king in Italy and a new pope. Certainly Germany will stake her all, and she fears war. "Finally," she added, "with courage the people of all countries will pass through these ordeals and a glorious future is assured."

CARNEGIE PENSION FOR EX-PRESIDENTS

Twenty-five Thousand Annually Where Government Does Not Provide.

New York, Nov. 21.—Future ex-presidents of the United States are to be pensioned in the sum of \$25,000 each annually, by action of the Carnegie Corporation of New York today. The grant is provided for with the idea of enabling former executives of the nation to devote their unique knowledge gained in public affairs to the public good, free from pecuniary care. A similar amount is to be paid widows of ex-presidents so long as they remain unmarried.

The pensions are to be promptly offered to the ex-presidents or their widows, so that no application will be required from them. Payment is to be continued so long as the recipients remain unprovided for by the Government.

The announcement followed the second annual meeting of the corporation, held at the residence of Andrew Carnegie here, and attended by the corporation's executive trustees.

A total of \$125,000,000 in securities has thus far been transferred to the corporation, which will carry on the various works in which Mr. Carnegie has been engaged, and such others as he may from time to time think it advisable to establish.
