

Mr. Rowell was glad to open the campaign in his own riding and to know the people in North Oxford had placed confidence in him. He was ready to obey the people's sl!ghtest wish in public matters. He outlined his policy in a clear, straightforward manner, that left no doubt as to what he would do for Ontario if he was returned premier. Is Out Flatfooted.

On the subject of abolish the bar there was no half-way business with him, He was out and out for it, and believed he was fair to all. Every man had a right to his own opinions but every temperance man who wanted to abolish the bar forever from the province should come forward and place himself on record of the same. Mr. Laidlaw, who was greeted with enthusiastic cheers and applause, expressed his gratitude to the electors of East Middlesex for the support accorded him in the last by-election. He referred to the marked reduction in the Conservative majority at that time, and expressed the belief that Liberals might confidently look for success this time if a strong and aggressive fight were made.
