BIG BROTHERS WILL CARE FOR YOUNGER ONES

Magistrate Judd and Men's Federation Get Their Heads Together.

WON'T MAKE CRIMINALS

Instead of Being Sent To Jail, Boys Will Be Put in Charge of Older Men.

In his efforts to reform delinquent juveniles who appear before him in the Carling street juvenile court and in order that the boys will grow up to be good citizens and not police court characters or criminals, His Worship Police Magistrate J. C. Judd commenced today to form a big brotherhood association in this city to look after these youths.

His worship, after a conference with D. H. McDermid, of the Men's Federation, will have the members of that body co-operate with him in his scheme to see if a stop cannot be put to the increasing crimes among juveniles in this city.

Big Brother in Charge. To a reporter the police magistrate stated his idea to be that whenever a juvenile appeared in court and was allowed to go on suspended sentence he would be turned over to a member of the Big Brotherhood Association. This man would be responsible for the boy who had gone astray, and will do all possible to try and get the lad to grow up a good citizen instead of a criminal. The society will have one member who will attend all juvenile trials to try and show the boys the advantage of keeping "straight" instead of "crooked."

Most Enthusiastic. D. H. McDermid, of the Men's Federation, in consultation with his worship, stated that he was very enthusiastic over the proposition, and announced that he would do all in his power to co-operate with the police magistrate in the latter's efforts to reform the youths.

Every now and then juvenile crimes have increased in this city. For the past couple of years, but few crimes were committed by juveniles. From the first of this year, however, the juveniles have been committing numerous crimes. His worship for months has been trying to work out some scheme whereby he could prevent so many youths going astray with the result that the Big Brotherhood Association will now be formed.

Four Youngsters Up. In the juvenile court today his worship had four youngsters before him for offenses they committed in the early part of the week, such as looting a Grand Trunk diner while it was standing on a switch and running handcar on the railway tracks. These boys were allowed to go on suspended sentence.

Those in touch with the juvenile crime situation in many cases blame the parents of the youths for the latter's delinquency.

MILITARY FIELD DAY

Will Take Place on Carling's Heights on 24th of May.

What promises to be the greatest military field day ever held in London will take place on Victoria Day on Carling's Heights. The sports will commence at 1:45 in the afternoon, and men from the 33rd and 34th Battalions, 7th Mounted Rifles and Divisional Staff will take part. Over \$200 worth of prizes have been secured, many of them being handsome wrist watches, safety razors and similar useful articles. A handsome silver cup has been donated by the officers of the 33rd and 34th Battalions for teams of 20 men in rifle exercises. The 33rd officers have also donated a silver cup for a football match between teams from the 33rd and 34th Battalions.

A feature of the program will be a pushball contest, with 20 men on each side, a tug-of-war, and a wrestling contest on horseback between mounted riflemen. There will also be a tug-of-war on horseback. Among the men in training here are some splendid runners, and the races will be keenly contested. All entries must be in by Saturday, and the events are open only to men of the overseas forces. The committees who are in charge of the arrangements are: 7th C. M. R.—Major Reason, chairman; Capt. The boys are very enthusiastic and hope to raise sufficient funds to have the monument take the form of a figured window, to be erected in St. Matthew's Church, where Sergeant Brady was scoutmaster previous to his enlistment.

ANOTHER TRAWLER SUNK BY GERMAN SUBMARINE

[Canadian Press.] Peterhead, Scotland, May 20.—The British trawler *Chrysolite* was sunk by a German submarine at a point 20 miles off Kinnaird's Head, in the North Sea, yesterday. The crew of the trawler took to the boats and all were landed here by a Norwegian steamer. It is believed that at least submarines are operating in these waters.

TENTED CITY ON CARLING HEIGHTS UP TO MINUTE

About 3,000 Soldiers Will Be Under Canvas By This Evening.

EVERYONE IS BUSY TODAY

"Housing" of So Many Men No Light Task—Officers and Men Pleased.

Close to 3,000 soldiers will be under canvas on Carling's Heights tonight. The troops include the 33rd Battalion, which marched to the Heights last yesterday afternoon, the 34th Battalion, which came from Guelph at 4:30 this afternoon, and a part of the 7th Mounted Rifles, which has been out on a bivouac.

Everyone at the big camp today was busy, as the task of getting 3,000 men comfortably settled in to small ones. From the men who slept last night on the Heights there was today a general call for more blankets. Many of the officers will be busy with the tents. A piercing wind, which blew across the Heights from the east all day, made it too cool for comfort, but the men, being busy, were not in their tents.

Camp Well Equipped. The camp is one of the best equipped and best laid out that has yet been held on Carling's Heights. It is unusually compact, the tents of the men and officers being close together. Each officer has a separate tent, while the soldiers occupy each of the others. Each officer's tent will be lighted by electricity, and lights will be strung at intervals throughout the camp. Gas pipes are being laid for cooking purposes, and city water will be available at convenient points. Shower baths and toilets connected with the city sewerage are also in operation. In short, the camp is the last word in comfort, and officers who have attended camps for years stated to The Advertiser that they had never seen anything like it.

All Enthusiastic. Both officers and men are enthusiastic over the new camp. While they are well satisfied with the fair grounds, they like the outdoor tent life much better.

At the southwest end of the heights, a special group of tents has been erected for the use of the headquarters staff. The transfer of the troops which have been training locally was carried out without a hitch, the only incident occurring when Capt. Peacock, chaplain of the 33rd Battalion, went to go to bed. He found it occupied by a soldier, who had been celebrating the anniversary of his birthday. The soldier was rudely awakened and ejected and then spent some time falling over tent ropes and pegs in the dark, trying to find a new place to sleep.

NEW GOVERNMENT BEGINS TO CLEAN UP

[Special to The Advertiser.] Winnipeg, Man., May 20.—The provincial treasurer ordered today an audit of the treasury department from November 30 last to May 1, when the new government took office. Also that all public buildings and assets shall be accounted for to their correct value and a complete report of all unexpended accounts for 1914 be made, as there is already \$400,000 of this class unexpended. In future no debt will be charged to capital account unless it properly belongs there.

POLITICS AND CONTRACTS

Two Evidently Don't Pull Well Together in This Little Old Town.

Changes which have been made in connection with the letting of contracts for the supplies at the local militia camp, have caused a great stir in political circles, and it was stated to The Advertiser this afternoon that all kinds of strings are being pulled by those who either had business and lost it or didn't get a "look in." Incidentally many local firms are claiming that absolutely unfair methods prevailed in that no tenders were advertised for. New contracts were let a couple of days ago, with the result, it is stated, that the meat will be supplied by the Harris Abattoir people of Toronto, instead of by George Jackson, who had the contract.

A change is to be made in connection with the bread supply, it is alleged, through the influence of Wm. Gray, M.P. No change, it is stated, has been made in connection with the grocery contracts, and many local firms claim that it would only be fair to at least give them a chance to figure. It was stated to The Advertiser that a few specially chosen firms were notified and then the contract awarded to the firm which had it before.

Local butchers declare it is absolutely unfair that a Toronto firm should get the meat contract. Mr. William Gray, it is stated, is having trouble of his own in connection with the matter.

Russ Shells Just Missed the Kaiser

Auto Destroyed and Chauffeur Killed—Emperor and Staff Flee.

GENEVA (via Paris), May 20.—12:30 a.m.—The German Emperor and his staff had a narrow escape on Sunday while watching the operations in a village near the River San, in Galicia. According to a dispatch from Budapest, a heavy shell burst 500 yards away. "I fell among some automobiles, destroying several machines, including the Emperor's, and killing his chauffeur. The Emperor left his car only fifteen minutes before."

LLOYD GEORGE ALREADY BUSY MAKING BULLETS

Whole Country Is To Be Organized to Provide War Munitions.

LONDON, May 20.—2:22 a.m.—The pressing need of increasing the supply of munitions, which, under the new Cabinet will be in complete control of David Lloyd George, was already, when the ministerial crisis occurred, the subject of the Chancellor's special preoccupation. He had, in fact, started on a tour of the Government production factories, which was interrupted by the crisis, but will be resumed immediately the crisis is over.

Measures of importance are already being taken. Among others, arrangements are on the eve of completion by the Glasgow Ordnance Committee for the closing of the five Clyde ship yards, in order that the workers employed therein may be transferred to munitions factories.

NEW JUDGES ARE NAMED FOR BRUCE

Judge Klein Promoted and Is Succeeded by A. M. Greig, K. C., of Almonte.

OTTAWA, May 19.—Judge A. B. Klein, junior judge of the county of Bruce for 22 years, has been promoted to be senior judge in the place of Judge Williams, who recently died.

POUND-NET FISHERMEN COMPLAIN OF GILL MEN

TORONTO, May 19.—Essex, Kent and Elgin pound net fishermen made protests today against the gill net fisherman of the same localities to the department of game and fisheries. They complained that the gill net men were encroaching on their territory within ten miles of the shore line. The department will investigate, and if charges are true take steps to keep the gill net fishermen to the deep waters.
