Financial, Market and Commercial Section

THE LOCAL MARKET

Hay was plentiful on the local market this morning. The loads brought in early sold for \$12. Later the price became firmer, and they brought from \$13 to \$14. Straw, however, remained scarce, selling at \$7.50 to \$8.50 a ton. New oats were slightly cheaper at \$1.55 to \$1.65 a cwt. Wheat was steady at \$1.12 a bushel for old and \$1.25 a bushel for new. Barley was unchanged at \$1.35 a cwt.

Potatoes dropped a little, bringing from \$1.50 to \$1.75 a bushel. Tomatoes remained firm at 45c to 55c a basket, and new cabbage were steady at 50c to \$2 a dozen. Beets were unchanged at 20c a dozen, and green onions at 40c. Corn was steady at 10c to 15c a dozen. Apples were sold at 50c to 80c a bushel. Plums brought 20c to 30c a basket. Pears were fairly plentiful at \$1 to \$1.25 a bushel. Peaches were firm at 50c to 80c a basket, while canteloupes remained steady at \$1 to \$2.25 a dozen. Grapes were steady at 25c to 30c a basket.

Butter was more plentiful, and the price dropped slightly. Creamery butter was retailed at 47c a pound, and dairy at 50c. Butter in crocks brought 32c a pound. Eggs were slightly cheaper at 23c a dozen, retail. Poultry prices were unchanged, young chickens bringing 15c a pound live weight, and old fowl 12c to 14c a pound. Ducks were sold at 12c to 13c a pound. Chickens retailed at 80c to \$1.40 a pair. Live hogs were steady at \$11.50 to \$11.75 a cwt. Sales of fat sows were made at \$9 to \$9.25 a cwt. Small pigs were steady at \$12 to \$14 a pair. Dressed hogs were firm, selling at \$13.50 to \$15 a cwt. Hides and wool were firm.

Option trade was almost entirely confined to the scalpers. There was no export wheat and the trading of the entire morning was within narrow bounds. There was a fair trade in oats, and a slight increase in price in flax, the latter due to reports of blight as well as frost damage to the north and central Saskatchewan areas. Cash demand was moderate throughout the day, both for contract and lower grades. No. 1 northern wheat carried a premium of 5c over the option, and the price for No. 6 wheat advanced 1/4c. Offerings were light.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 22—Wheat prices developed considerable strength today as a result of a scarcity of offerings and because of reports that rains in Argentina had not affected the wheat crop. The lack of moisture being in the north, whereas the rains had fallen in the south and west. Bears also were disappointed by assertions that mills in the Dakotas were shutting down owing to difficulty in obtaining supplies. Opening prices, which ranged from 3/4 to 1 1/4c higher, with December at \$1.50 1/2, \$1.51 1/2, and May at \$1.51 1/2. The market was followed by substantial additional gains.

COTTON PRICES SOAR; BRISK TRADE BUYING

Advance in New York 20 to 23 Points—Spot Strong.

[Reported by Thomson & McKinnon.]

Prices ran up 20 to 23 points from the low level of the morning on a report that a Chicago house will issue a very bullish crop report in a day or two. This was followed by good buying by the west, the Waldorf and Wall Street, as well as covering by room shorts, and last, but far from least, excellent buying by trade interests.

Spot houses and mills want the cotton and they are buying it on breaks right along. Some of the buying of December, too, was believed to be taking in hedges by southern spot houses, as they sold the cotton to exporters. New York and Liverpool, as well as New Orleans, believe that the October Government report will be bullish.

The crop is being picked, ginned and marketed with greater celerity than any crop for years. Spot markets are strong with a good demand, and weevil reports from Texas are bad.

WALL STREET.

New York, Sept. 22—Wall Street, noon—Trading during the first hour was again on the basis of 2,000,000 share season with only slight improvement of activity as the noon hour approached. Steel, at the new maximum of 11 1/2, together with the metals and half a score of specialties, furnished an overwhelming percentage of the whole.

But rails later advanced some rising to the best prices of the year, while Union Pacific at 14 1/2, was at its highest quotation since the beginning of the war. Scarcely any division of the stock list was unaffected by the movement, whose underlying factors were more impressive than any market of recent weeks. Bonds were firm.
