

VOTE FOR STRIKE.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 30.—Employees in the engine, train and yard service of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railroad have voted in favor of a strike if necessary to satisfy their grievances and have given the railroad until 6 p.m. today to reply.

QUITS CARRANZA.

QUARTAJARO, Mex., Nov. 30.—Jesus Carranza, minister of the interior, formerly minister of foreign affairs, today wired his formal resignation to General Carranza, saying he could not continue his duties longer, according to an authoritative statement here. No reason was made known for Carranza's reported action.

The Vancouver Sun, commenting on the Brewster cabinet, says: "On the whole it represents an unusually high level of intelligence and integrity, and will prove most acceptable to the people of the province."

BRITAIN'S ECONOMIC WAR CAUSES WAILS FROM GERMAN SIDE

Cut Off All Imports, Says Minister of Interior.

USES IT IN APPEAL

Declares All Germans Must Work to Make Up for Trade Loss.

BERLIN, Nov. 30, via Sayville.—Speaking in the Reichstag yesterday on the "man power" bill, Dr. Helfferich, minister of the interior, said: "The home army and field army in this war join hands for an indissoluble union. Underneath the German soil are rich treasures, but they must be lifted to the daylight."

Dr. Helfferich then quoted an historic German song, which a century ago, during the war of deliverance, inspired the German troops—"The Lord who made iron to grow wants no slaves."

"This is as true today as it was a century ago, as it always will be," said the minister. "This is a war carried on, not only with arms, but it is an economic war of nations. Germany, which always speaks of protecting neutrality, has by her interference with mail, spying system and blacklists cut off necessary imports from them, and has caused them more damage than ever an enemy could do."

"In this economic war we, together with our allies, stand in all essential things alone. Our enemies can continue to import from across the seas. England, as her chancellor of the exchequer has stated, has thus bought every week to the amount of twelve million pounds, which is twelve thousand million marks a year. France, during ten months, paid for the same purpose twelve thousand million francs. Half the world is at our enemies' disposal."

"We have no transatlantic imports; we must rely upon our own work and must produce what we need by our own work. The earth yields what we need for food. But we must work, and once more have peace. This law mobilizes work; it does not begin, but completes the mobilization of national work."

MORAL CANCER IS EATING WAY INTO VITALS OF CITY

Toronto Investigators Uncover Revolting Records.

EXPOSURE IS STARTLING

Moral Depravity of Feeble-Minded Shown in Reports Presented.

TORONTO, Nov. 30.—Startling exposures of the revolting conditions, and the extent to which moral depravity has eaten its way into the vitals of "Toronto the good," were made by Dr. C. K. Clark, of the Toronto General Hospital and University of Toronto, and Dr. Clair Hinks, of the psychiatric clinic at the meeting of the Academy of Medicine tonight.

After two years of active investigations and a closer study of conditions in Toronto a census has been compiled of the conditions among the feeble-minded in Toronto.

Dr. Clair Hinks said: "After two and a half years of investigation the results of 1,445 examinations have been compiled. Fifty-five per cent of the feeble-minded cases examined are habitual criminals. We examined 235 feeble-minded people who are habitual thieves, all of whom are still at large in the city. One hundred and twenty cases have murderous intentions and are still roaming the city streets, some of these examined will possibly commit murder, and some have done it."

"Sixty per cent of all the social victims on the streets are feeble-minded. Of 201 cases of absolute incorrigibility among feeble-minded school children, fifty-three were victims of immorality, each one a pug-centre of moral contagion."

A commission has been appointed by order-in-council of the Manitoba Government to take over the work of the provincial morality department. The commission is composed of Rev. J. N. MacLean, chairman, provincial commissioner, R. N. Noble, provincial police magistrate, and J. McKercher, judge of the juvenile court. The resignation of W. J. Battley, chief of the morality department, has been accepted.

INTERPROVINCIAL BONDS TO BE STILL MORE CLOSELY TIED

Quebec Will Return Ontario's Bon Entente Visit.

MONTREAL, Nov. 30.—The return visit in connection with the Bon Entente will be made to Ontario by professional and businessmen of the province of Quebec early in January, next. This was decided upon today at a meeting of the council of the Bon Entente, held in the Montreal Board of Trade building, and presided over by Sir George Garneau, Toronto, Hamilton, Niagara Falls, and other cities will be visited, and representatives of other places in this province than those visited by the Ontario pilgrims some time ago, will join the touring party.

A permanent executive with Sir George Garneau of Quebec, as chairman, and Mr. J. M. Godfrey of Toronto, as vice-chairman, was appointed as follows: Quebec: Hon. L. P. Pelletier, judge of the court of appeals, Quebec; Mr. Zep Hebert, and Mr. Huntly Drummond of Montreal; ex-Mayor Hebert of Sherbrooke; Mr. S. H. Parsons and E. Ames of Toronto; Kirwan Martin of Hamilton, and Lieut.-Col. Mulloy of Kingston.

THIS U. S. INTERVENTION SEEMS MORE SUCCESSFUL

Dominican Republic Put Under Military Rule by American Navy.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Captain Knapp, commanding the American naval forces in Dominican waters, has by proclamation declared a military rule in the Dominican republic to break the deadlock in the local government and carry out the treaty obligations of the United States to guarantee interest in the public debt and other obligations.

Captain Knapp today notified Secretary Daniels of his action, and it was approved. He said he expected to have affairs straightened out by December 2, and reported conditions quiet and the populace satisfied with his action. There was no military clash and no military governor was appointed, as reported from Santo Domingo.


Since the election of the new president in Santo Domingo, affairs have been in a deadlock because the local Government refused to permit payment of obligations which the U. S. has pledged itself to see fulfilled. Affairs became so involved, it was said here, that Capt. Knapp, acting under full authority with which he is clothed, put the island under military rule temporarily, to preserve order and carry out the local government's obligations.


