



Claims Remarks Were an Unwarranted and Malicious Attack On Him.

Following the statement of Public chool Inspector V. K. Greer, published a The Advertiser Saturday, where he registered his disapproval of advertising 100 per cent entrance classes, Times-Journal of St. Thomas says: "Principal John A. Dale of the

Myrtle Street School, considers that an unwarranted and malicious at-tack was made upon him by School Inspector V. K. Greer of London, Ont., when the latter criticized his record of passing 100 per cent of his pupils at entrance examinations for three consecutive years. Inspector Greer said a record such as this was a 'sure sign of bad classification.'
"Interviewed on Monday morning,
Mr. Dale said he thought the inspector's attack was not only unreasonable, but unworthy.
"'An inspector should be a man to

encourage teachers, not to discourage them, commented Mr. Dale, and besides, if to pass 100 per cent every teacher, then what should be his aim?

"The only interpretation that I can put upon Mr Greer's remarks is that he wishes to intimate that the entrance classes are especially picked. This is, of course, absurd. Any pupil who has fulfilled the requirements of the lower classes has the opportunity of trying the entrance examinations, so that my classes are composed of pupils just as they come.'

"Inspector Greer, Mr. Dale main. tained, was in no position to know the facts of the case in the first place, and was, besides, acting en-tirely outside his province when he undertook to criticize examination results in neighboring inspector-

When shown the article by an Advertiser reporter this morning. Inspector Greer said: "I have no quarrel to pick with Mr Dale, and have no answer for him in the excitable that the said of him in the spirit that he has assumed In fact, I merely mentioned his name in connection with the article in the Toronto Globe advertising 100 per cent entrance classes.

"His comments do not bother me at all. My 'attack' was not malicious, as stated in the St. Thomas paper. Anything which I said was not in the spirit of battle.
