

BIG WATER MAIN TO BE LOWERED

Suburban Area Commissioners Discuss Pipe Line Road Paving.

Question Left in Hands of Buchanan and Talbot.

The suburban area commission ran up against a snag in connection with the work to be done on the Pipe Line road this summer in preparation for paving operations in 1923, when they were informed by County Engineer Charles Talbot at a meeting at the County Buildings Thursday night that the water main running from Springbank to London would have to be lowered if the hill at Arthur's icehouse was to be graded properly.

Mr. Talbot explained that it might also be necessary to make a fill near the icehouse of three feet.

The commissioners threshed the matter over and finally left it in the hands of Mr. Talbot, who will consult with E. V. Buchanan of the public utilities, and then report back to the commission.

It was decided to call for new tenders for the building of seven culverts on the Pipe Line road this summer.

The commissioners set their stamp of approval on the plans of the new G. T. R. bridge on the River road leading to Springbank.

Those present at the meeting were: Commissioners E. S. Little, Jack Greer, Archie Blake, J. L. Robson, J. Winters, County Engineer Charles Talbot and County Clerk John Stuart.

WORLD NEWS CUT SHORT

SIMLA, India, April 20.—One British officer was killed in a clash between British troops and tribesmen of Jalalkehl, according to a report reaching here Thursday.

HAVANA, Cuba, April 20.—Four persons are known to have been killed and about 100 injured when a house in Arroyo Arenas, a village near Havana, collapsed last night under the weight of spectators while a religious procession was passing through the streets.

MEXICO CITY, April 20.—The basis under which the federal agrarian law is to be administered is outlined in the decree signed by President Obregon, which is expected to become effective today upon publication.

The decree contains 28 articles, which describe the methods of land expropriation and distribution, with a preface pointing out why certain people have inherent rights to the land which the government plans to confiscate. Six classes of towns ranging from considerable villages to the smallest communities, are named as beneficiaries, and the properties to be taken include cultivated as well as uncultivated.

The following classes are prohibited from acquiring allotments: Professional men, those who possess lands similar to those expropriated; persons having capital of more than 1,000 pesos, and federal or municipal employees earning salaries of more than 75 pesos a month.

PARIS, April 20.—The Duchess of Talleyrand's counsel denied that she had already been granted her divorce. The case was on the list for Wednesday last, but was not called. Both sides asked a postponement pending negotiations between friends of the duke and duchess in view of a possible reconciliation.

With regard to the report printed in Canada that the former Miss Anna Gould has renounced her claim to the custody of her son by the Duke of Talleyrand, it was said that the question has not been officially raised.

The character of the boy, who is now nine years old, is said to be unsympathetic to the mother, and the latter is rumored to have complained more than once that he must be a changeling.

Such exclamations of impatience, however, have never been taken seriously by the Gould-Talleyrand families. No one doubts that the duchess did really give birth to a boy, and not to a girl, as was also suggested.

BERLIN, April 20.—The criminal police today arrested 15 Armenians in a big round-up, seeking to destroy what is alleged to be a secret murder organization, whose headquarters, the Berlin police say, is in America, whence the Berlin branch is financed.

This activity results from a double political murder committed early yesterday morning, of which two young Turks were the victims. They were Djemal Azmy Bey, former governor-general of Trebizond, and Baha Eddin Chakir, a prominent member of the pro-German committee of union and progress.

They were returning with their wives and children, as well as the widow of Talaat Pasha, who was murdered here last year, and other Turkish friends, from a gathering at a fellow-Turk's house. They were passing through Uhlendstrasse, a fashionable residential street, when two slim, undersized swarthy men lurking in a doorway rushed out, thrust the women aside and fired several rounds pointblank at the two objects of their vengeance and made their escape under cover of revolver fire, which was directed at the Turk-

UNCLE TOM'S CABIN THRILLS AUDIENCE

Grand Opera House Presentation Ranks High as Play of Exceptional Merit.

REALISTIC SETTINGS

Acting of Talented Artists Augments Appeal of Production.

If the capacity houses which greeted the two performances of Uncle Tom's Cabin at the Grand Theatre Thursday can be taken as any criterion, Harriet Beecher Stowe's pathetic tale of little Eva, Uncle Tom and Topsy, has lost little of the appeal which stirred a nation 70 odd years ago and which did much to win freedom for the slaves of the Southern States.

Ranks Among Best. Uncle Tom's Cabin has been presented by many different companies with such varying degrees of success, that it is with considerable pleasure that one discovers that the play now appearing at the Grand ranks among the best. Certainly it has not been excelled in this city by any other production bearing the same name in several years.

It is being staged with much attention to detail, and it follows closely the lines of the book. The cast is large, with the leads for the most part acted admirably. The settings are realistic, and at times are fairly pretentious. The costumes were created true to the prevailing styles of the past century and seemed almost new in their freshness. Little Eva, too ethereal to remain on earth, was delicately portrayed by Baby Vera. She was especially good in the death scene. Topsy, the delight of every child of the audience, was impersonated by Edna Clare. Miss Clare introduced so much quiet comedy into her lines and acting that her every appearance was greeted by laughter.

Thus Collins, well known to the stage, played the part of Uncle Tom, and all the other male characters were good. Lawyer Marks, played by Jos. Barnum, was responsible for considerable comedy. Joseph Franklin was all that could be desired as a blood-curdling Simon Legree, while D. De Bruin proved quite a satisfactory Alphonse St. Clair.

Real Treat of Show. Several colored boys, who were by no means imitations, provided the real treat of the show by much excellent dancing and some singing. Between acts they provided some first-class vaudeville. Two great dogs assisted in creating the thrills of the play. The show will be repeated both afternoon and evening, Friday.

DRURY RECEIVES ORANGE PETITIONS

TORONTO, April 20.—Petitions with near 300,000 names, protesting against the taxation demands of the Roman Catholic bishops of the province, and against any change in regulation 17 of the Ontario school act, were presented to Premier Drury by H. C. Hocken, M.P., Hon. W. D. McPherson, Ben Kirk and L. H. Reed, representing the Orange Order of Ontario.

Premier Drury, in reply, said he had already announced that the demands of the bishops would not be granted, and considered the presentation of the petitions as unnecessary. He realized, however, that faith had to be kept with those who had signed the petitions.
