CANADIAN CORPS WON GLORY BY SMASHING HINDENBERG LINE AT ARRAS FOUR YEARS AGO TODAY

Second and Third Divisions, Followed by First and Fourth, by Gallant Work Open Way to Victory and Capture of Drocourt-Queant Switch in Retreat of Huns to Canal du Nord.

On Aug. 8, 1918, the Canadian corps, fighting alongside the Australians in front of Amiens, struck the first blow in the final offensive of the war. Initial success was due largely to the surprise nature of the attack, but as the corps fought its way eastwards the enemy defense stiffened and the battleground over the old trenches of the Somme became more and more difficult. The attack perceptibly slowed up.


