Aylmer May Drop Out of Southern Baseball Loop

Meeting Last Night Found St. Thomas, Woodstock, Stratford and London Lined Up—May Adopt Split Season At March 9 Meeting.

When the Southern Ontario Baseball League is finally launched, it looks very much as if it will be a four-team affair, with St. Thomas, Woodstock, Stratford and London in the case. As a meeting held last night in the Chamber of Commerce, the league went over the situation pretty thoroughly, but no definite meeting date, except to name another meeting date, March 9, the place to be designated later.

President Gifford of St. Thomas presided over the meeting, which found representatives from the four cities mentioned above and from Aylmer. The Milk Town, which provided last season one of the main reasons for the failure of the league, was not present. Aylmer, who was very doubtful about the league, was rather lukewarm about the idea, but he did not make any arguments against the arrangement.

The meeting accomplished little work, but it did give the clubs a chance to get together, and air a lot of sound optimism over the approaching season's prospects. Even though the league is not yet organized, it is encouraging to add to the general enthusiasm, and for a one-year-old circuit, there is plenty of good feeling and hope. Aylmer would enter a team probably if four players who played last year could be secured, which may be made out of the league.

The representatives present were: St. Thomas, R. J. Cottrill and W. J. Butcher; Woodstock, J. B. Sutherland and W. Blacklock; Stratford, H. Selig; Aylmer, W. D. Swachhammer, and from L. A. A. George Martin, Ted Brand and Stan Reid. George Walker, Stratford's team representative, was also an interested attendant.

Kitchener, Feb. 21.—Kitchener's Junior O. H. It was a smart exhibition of junior hockey, with plenty of speed and great back checking throughout, but the Kitchener kids stood the pace better than their Toronto rivals, despite the fact that the visitors had a distinct advantage in substitutes. The Kitchener team never used more than one at a time, and only infrequently, as they did not have the class of the regulars, while the visitors' team play was not at all weakened when the subs were on.

It was a scrappy game of hockey, and Referee Cully Rucker had a hard time to manage affairs, but he did well. There were 22 penalties, the Toronto team going 18 of them. The visitors started to use their bodies, but they found that the local kids were no mean artists themselves in that line, and the Toronto Bathurst street lads came out second best in the bumping duel, and after three-quarters of the way through each period were pretty well fagged out.

Over-Anxious. In the first period the Kitchener team passed up many splendid chances to tally by over-anxiousness, their shooting being away off. So far, only a notice of motion is before the annual spring meeting, making the residence date January 1, and in case this is passed it will be retroactive. It will cause a good deal of hardship the first year, but sentiment in favor of clean amateur ball is growing, and although the leagues may flounder a little bit, they'll obey the rule. This is especially true of the leagues affiliated with the O. B. A., who perhaps haven't taken the residence rule as seriously as they might have. There is going to be a lot more affidavits sworn to this year also. In fact, it is rumored that the O. B. A. might consider the services of some permanent and paid warring legal light to go about the country taking these sworn statements.
