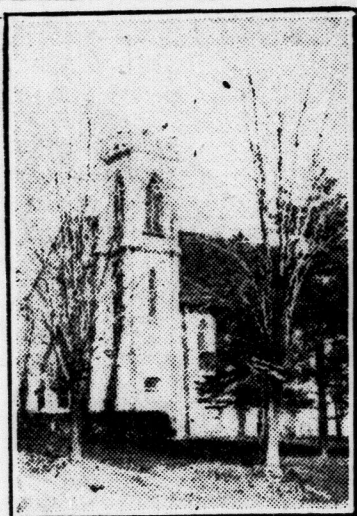

SYNOD SANCTIONS BIDWELL'S STAND

Head of Anglican Diocese of Ontario Takes Determined Attitude.

Kingston, Oct. 6.—Meeting here today, the executive committee of the synod of the Anglican diocese of Ontario decided to accept the resignation of R. Rev. E. J. Bidwell, bishop of the diocese, when his lordship again insisted that his decision was final. The executive voted the bishop an honorarium equivalent to six months' stipend.

Bishop Bidwell, who has been the church of England head in the diocese, which comprises a large district in Eastern Ontario, for twelve years, offered his resignation following the announcement that his wife had been converted to the Roman Catholic faith.

When the meeting opened this morning the bishop handed a statement to the members, in which he again insisted that his resignation be accepted.

"I have come to the conclusion," said Bishop Bidwell in his statement, "that it is my duty to withdraw from my position as bishop of the diocese. I am fully aware that many, after the action of the house of bishops, will question this decision. Nevertheless, I am quite convinced that, in view of all circumstances, the future welfare of the church in this diocese, which is bound to be my main consideration, will be best assured by the action on which I have determined, and feel sure that my decision will not be misunderstood by the house of bishops. In order that I may have, as I am sure you would wish, ample time to secure some other suitable sphere of work, I propose to continue the administration of the diocese until next Easter, a period of six months, on the understanding that I am free to relinquish the position at any time before that date."

In accepting his resignation, the executive committee placed on record its deep appreciation of his lordship's twelve years of administration.

"While expressing feelings of sincere regret," the executive stated, "the committee finds itself obliged to submit, in view of the very deeply stirred state of feeling throughout the diocese, created by his wife's change of religious allegiance, that his lordship would seem to have chosen the wisest course."

GERMANY STALLS AT JOINING LEAGUE

Conditions May Prove Obstacles at Security Pact Meet in Locarno.

Locarno, Switzerland, Oct. 6.—Despite the secrecy of the negotiations, the following may be taken as probably an accurate summary of the situation at the security pact conference:

There are six documents on the agenda, namely the Rhine pact, four arbitration treaties between Germany on the one hand and France, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, and Poland on the other, and finally a treaty establishing the French guarantee of German-Czech and German-Polish arbitration treaties.

At the present moment all attention is centered on the Rhine pact, which consists of a preamble and eleven clauses. This pact concerns France, Belgium and Germany, with Great Britain as guarantor. If they finally accept the present draft of the text, the signatories will repudiate the idea of war and agree to respect the status quo of their common frontiers and demilitarized zone on the Rhineland.

Any signatory, who, in a breach of the arbitration agreements, resorts to war by violation of a frontier or by a menace of military concentration in the demilitarized zone, is declared the aggressor and others, including Great Britain, agree to combine against him. This is the essence of the pact. Other clauses provide that the pact shall in no respect be interpreted as modifying existing treaties or obligations of signatories under the League covenant and shall only take effect when Germany enters the League, when the four arbitration treaties are ratified and the French guarantee of the Czech and Polish treaties is accepted.

Regarding the main conditions of the pact there is practically no dispute, hence the effective expression of goodwill in which the conference thus far has abounded. Delegates and experts are still engaged in putting the finishing touches to non-controversial clauses. The difficulties will begin when they come to consider the clause foresees German entry into the League and the clause foresees French guarantee of the Czech and Polish treaties. The Germans seem ready to join the League, but only with various conditions and reservations. They are willing that the French and Belgian arbitration treaties shall cover all possible disputes, juridical, economic and political, but they wish to limit arbitration to non-political questions, and they declare firmly they will never accept that France shall guarantee these treaties as Great Britain is guaranteeing the Belgian and French.

It is in these questions, therefore, that the real danger lies. On them the conference will either succeed or fail.

METHOD OF COMBATING COMMUNISM REPORTED

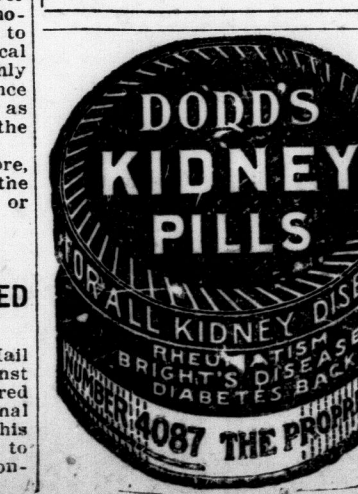
