1. That the name of this board be changed to The Vactoria, British Columbia, Board of Trade, and that the proper steps be taken to effect such alteration.

2. That paragraphs 1, 2 and 4 of the by-laws be amended by the insertion of the word "Victoria" before the words "British Columbia" in the name of this board wherever it occurs therein.

In moving the foregoing resolution Mr. Crease urged the advisability of changing the name, stating several valid reasons, chief of which was that the name British Columbia Board of Trade was deceiving and arrogated a field of usefulness to the board which it did not possess. Again, it would be greatly to the advantage of Victoria to adopt the distinctive name, which would tend to make the city more widely knewn abroad.

Mr. J. Shallcross seconded the motion. He said the day had passed when the Victoria Board of Trade represented British Columbia. Other and important centres of trade had sprung up in ofher parts of the country, and the retention of the name would be a case of sailing under false colors and mitigated against Victoria, inasmuch as it actually defeated the object which first prompted its adoption.
