The future depends very much on railroad earnings and Congressional action. It is a waiting market, and that is about all you can say for it.

F. J. Lewis & Coa from Kennett, Hopkins & Co.: Another effort was made by speculators to stimulate prices on American securities in London, but it did not produce much effect to-day upon prices, as it did yesterday. It is difficult for a commission broker to speak with much patience of such a market as this, for there is no business doing except by professional traders, most of them room traders: who execute their own orders.
