Dommon Forestry Convention

July 7-9 has been fixed as the date of the Dominion Forestry Convention to be held in the City of Winnipeg. From all the provinces of the Dominion, and from many of the states south of the line, there will assemble an exceptional gathering for the consideration of problems connected with the preservation and extension of the forest resources. Prairie planting and woodlot management will form a large part of the proceedings, but other matters, particularly the ever pressing problem of forest fire protection, will be fully discussed. The sessions will be held in the hall of the Industrial Bureau, and the Provincial Government, the City of Winnipeg and other organizations will join in welcoming the delegates. The railways are granting to delegates convention rates, and it is expected that through the far-reaching importance of the discussions of the Convention, and the added attractions of Winnipeg and the west at the beginning of harvest,

Deanery Meeting and S. S. Convention

The annual meeting of the Deanery of Lambton and the Sunday School Convention was held in Trinity Church, Watford, Wednesday of last week. At 10.30 the morning holy communion was celebrated by the Rev. Canon Davis, M.A., rural dean. The meeting of the chapter was held immediately afterwards. The business of the chapter was presented by the rural dean. After routine business the Rev. W. T. Hill, M.A., of Petrolia, moved a resolution expressing the regret of the deanery at learning of the death of the Rev. G. W. Racey, of Kirkton, and asked the Rev. D. J. Cornish, to attend the funeral as the representative of the Deanery of Lambton.

The Sunday School Association held its session in the afternoon, beginning at 2.30. Col. Kenward, the president of the association, occupied the chair. Reports were read from departmental superintendents, indicating marked progress in the Sunday School work in the deanery. The following officers were elected: President, Col. Kenward; vice-president, Mr. George Gabler, of Sarnia; secretary-treasurer, Rev. W. M. Shore; superintendents of departments: teacher training, Mr. Kelly, Courtright; home, Mr. A. Conn, Sarnia; primary and font roll, Mrs. H. M. Parsons, Forest; missionary, Mr. W. M. Shore, Warwick; adult Bible class, Rev. S. P. Irwin, Watford; representative on the diocesan committee of management of the Sunday School Association, Mr. J. B. Dale, Wyoming.

A conference was conducted by the diocesan secretary, Rev. T. B. Howard, who was followed by Rev. Rural Dean Robinson, of Stratroy, who spoke very helpfully from his own knowledge and experience of the workings of the organized adult Bible class. Mr. Parsons, of Forest, discussed the 'Ideal Teacher' in a forceful address.

The evening session was given over to the hearing of addresses from Rev. T. B. R. Westgate and Dr. Tucker. Rev. Mr. Westgate was welcomed in his own home town by a large and greatly interested

congregation. It was decided to have the fall meeting of the chapter and convention in Christ Church, Petrolia. Rev. Canon Davis, of Sarnia, suggested that the Deanery of Lambton have some part in the establishment of a theological college in German East Africa. The meeting acted on the suggestion and arrangements were made to carry it into effect.
