IRELAND.

In the assumption of the Premiership Mr. Gladstone has several formidable difficulties to face, and, if possible, to remove; and perhaps the condition of Ireland is at her source of more anxiety and perplexity than all the other embarrassing matters with which he must necessarily grapple.

The who civilized world is sympathizing with Ireland in the wide-spread destitution and starving condition of multitudes of her people. This is only a temporary calamity which the next harvest will probably dispel.

In a telegram dated Vienna, May the 10th, it is announced: "Russia is reported to have consulted European Governments and the United States for the advisability of transferring their embassies from Pekin to Shanghai, on account of the excitement at Pekin."

This is refreshingly cool. It is an intrusive intermeddling with other people's affairs—an impudent suggestion. Suppose China had consulted other nations, advising them to transfer their embassies from St. Petersburg to Archangel or Siberia, on account of nihilism at St. Petersburg—how wide would the Car have opened his mouth in an attitude of astonishment.

Russia has enough to do at home without playing the knight-errant's part in assuming to rectify all the evils, redress all the national wrongs, in the world. She may put on the air of a chivalrous knight, while she is actuated by the spirit of a predatory hand.

The rights of land-property are regarded (and very properly) by jurists as too sacred to be touched or meddled with. As a rule, the ownership of real estate should not be invaded unless some overpowering emergency demands such an encroachment on private ownership, and for which there should be ample compensation.

It is to be regretted that the "bone and sinew" of the Irish peasantry are leaving the land of their fathers. Oppression necessitates their emigration. Caprice, vindictiveness, or some other prompting motive on the part of landlords has prompted them to eject many an honest, hard working tenant from a hereditary home, which his forefathers may have occupied for centuries.
