## A BUSY FIRM

Denton & Condon Have Built Fifty-Three Railway Stations

With the new Dominion Atlantic station at Digby, Denton & Condon have built 53 railway stations in the Maritime Provinces and Quebec, beside a number of private residences and several government wharves or breakwaters. Both Messrs Denton and Condon are young men. Their first job was the Life Saving Station at Bay View on the west side of Digby Gut, and this was only built a few years ago. Both are Digby county men. Mr. Denton resides in Digby and Mr. Condon now resides in Kentville. They have recently been awarded the building of a big cannery factory at Aylesford and also have under construction about half a dozen dwelling houses. We wish them continued success.
