Gentlemen,—In reply to yours re shipping cattle to British Columbia I beg to state that I shipped last year in the months of March, April and May, cattle that were wintered on the range without any feed, only what they could get themselves, and after being driven one hundred miles and a railroad travel of 450 miles, they weighed from 1250 to 1450 lbs. gross—three and four year old steers. I consider this the best stock country in Canada or any part of the Western States. I have been in Montana and several other Western States and certainly think that Alberta far exceeds anything I have seen for stockraising. I have just killed and shipped thirty head of three and four year old steers, range stock, that dressed 875 lbs. average, several weighing 1100 lbs.
