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

THERE are people who think they cannot cat or digest anything which is made light by the use of soda or baking-powder, and there really are those who cannot. For the perceipt is here given for waffles which are raised with yeast, and which will be found highly satisfactory: One quart of flour, the quart of sweet milk, five tablespoonfuls or about half a medium-sized cup of yeast, at least one teaspoonful of salt. Mix well and let it stand all night. In the morning stir in one teaspoonful of melted butter and two well-beaten tygs. Bake in waffle-irons, and cat without fear of pain or distress.

To Make White Bread.—Set a rather

TO MAKE WHITE BREAD.—Set a rather thick spodge at night, using two yeast cakes for four common-sized loaves. Mix with warm water—never with milk. In the morning add to the sponge one cup of butter and three tablespoonful's of sugar beaten to a cream, and one teaspoonful of salt; then add flour to make as often can be hardled and cream, and one teaspoonful of salt; then add flour to make as soft as can be handled, and mould one hour. Let it rise till very light, then mould it sgain a few minutes—not more than ten. Let it rise again, but not so light; then squeeze it apart to make loaves. Mould each loaf five minutes. When light, rub a little melted butter over the top of each loaf and bake. Bread made like this is deliciously tender, white and flaky.

To Clean Paint.—When painted work is badly discoloured, put a tablespoonful of ammonia water into a quart of moderately bot water, and with the aid of flannel wipe off the surface. Rubbing is not necessary. When the discolouration is not great the following method is preferable:—With a piece of clean flannel wet with clean warm water, and then, squeezed nearly dry, take up as much whiting of the best quality as will adhere; apply this with moderate rubbing to the paintid work, and afterwards wash the surface with clean water, and rub it dry with chaspois leather. This method is imperior to the use of soap, requires but half the time and labour, and leaves the surface cleaned, looking as good as new. It will not injure delicate colours,
