

## COMMERCIAL.

Toronto, Sept. 18.

There has been little change in the Old Country wheat market, although what there has been has tended towards lower prices. The new wheat crop, now prevailing in the markets here, gives it a lower appearance in comparison with prices a week or two ago than exists in reality; for old wheat would still bring higher prices than the new. New York and Western markets are still somewhat uncertain, and rather weak. In Montreal there is not much doing and prices are lower in sympathy with the Old Country rates. Flour is dull sale. Superior extra is quoted at \$5.50 to \$5.60; Spring extra at \$5.10, strong Bakers, \$5 to \$5.50, and fine at \$5.75 to \$6.

Regarding the butter market, the "Gazette" says:—

"A few orders for butter have been received here from England during the past week, some of which have been filled in the Eastern Townships at 20 cents, for fine goods a few selected lots having been taken in this market at 21 to 21½. One shipper, however, who received orders, could not do anything, as his limits were too here, and at that figure he failed to get anything fine enough. There has been some business in Western butter in the country within the past few days in car lots at 16 to 16½. In cheese there is more doing both here and in the country, the Allan Grove Combination having sold about 20,000 boxes, consisting of August, September and October makes, but the terms are private. The sale is also reported of 2,000 boxes of a New York State factory on spot at 11c, also the August make of two fine French factories at 10½c to 11c. At Stratford to-day a lot of 700 boxes of August make sold at 12c.

Here matters on the produce market are dull, owing to the prevailing uncertainty as to prices. White wheat old is worth about \$1.11, while new red is at about \$1.03.

On the street grain has come in fairly well. Wheat brings about 95c to \$1.00 for fall, and spring about \$1.10. Oats are worth 49 to 52c, and barley 65 to 70c.

Butter is at 22 to 27c per lb rolls, and 18 to 20c for tub dairy.

The following is from the "Globe" of Saturday on the cattle market:—

There was only a moderate business done at the Western Cattle Market to-day. About 125 head of cattle were on the market. Two car loads went on to Montreal for export. The prices for good cattle for export are still 6½c, 5½c, and 6c. Good butchers

cattle are bought at 4½c to 5c; choice beasts a fraction dearer; ordinary, 3½c to 4c. There were a few sheep; good animals for export are 6c; for local consumption 4½c. Lambs were not in sufficient supply for the demand, and sold readily at \$3.50 to \$4.00, and best animals at highest figures. Hogs are offering more freely; light and thin for feeding purposes bring \$5.50 for 100 lbs. live weight; better hogs, \$7.00 to \$7.50. The market was generally cleaned out this morning, only a few beasts being left over.

## CATTLE.

Receipts of cattle thus far this week 12,670 head, against 14,353 to corresponding date last week; decrease 1,683. Shipments 11,371 against 11,800 last week; decrease 429. The offerings were fair to-day, but prices were weak and easy. A herd of heavy shippers was taken by two New York buyers at \$8.00. Butchers took hold to some extent at \$5.00 to \$6.00 for good Kansas and Cherokee steers, and \$4.65 to \$4.70 for lighter weights of fair quality. A load of Kansas cows and calves bringing \$3.90. Receipts of hogs thus far this week 23,610 head, against 23,760 to corresponding date last week, 10,119. Shipments 21,275 against 21,335 last week; decrease 60. Owing to an accident on the Lake Shore road trains were detained and the off rings therefore light. The market was firm for good hogs but dull for common, yet about everything was sold. Light to fair grassers brought \$6.75 to \$7.25, good to choice corn-fed Yorkers, \$8.00 to \$8.50, and good butchers and medium grade, \$8.50 to \$9.00 to \$9.75.

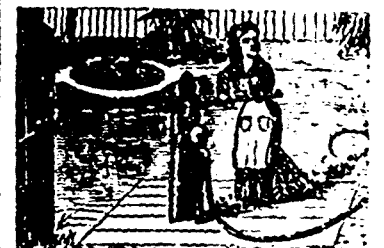

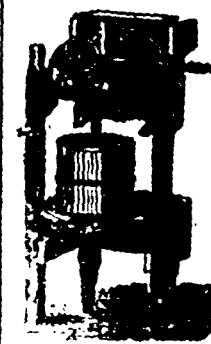
