The parents and triends of the pupils attending the Mount St. Louis Institute were much gratified at the results of the year's work shown at the exhibition which was given at the College building on Monday evening. The work of the boys was arranged on tables, each table representing the work of one class in the different subjects. The first table attracted a good deal of attention as it was the work of the smaller boys of the school, ranging in age from six to ten years, and the work shown was excellent, especially the geography. The boys of this class are taught especially the location of the different cities and towns in heir own province and the railroads which they are asked to work out on a map drawn by the teacher. Among others the work of a little eight-year-old ad named Jacques Michel McKercher showed not only aptness on the part of the purit but the patience required by the teacher. All the classes are care-fully graded, and the advancement from one to the other is hardly noticeable. Although only nine years of age he manages to keep pace with boys of twelve and fourteen. 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
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
