The special taxes and stamp duties heretofore announced are modified as follows: Mutual insurance companies are exempted.

The tax on ocean steamship tickets is changed so that the \$3 tax will be on tickets up to \$40 instead of \$30 and the \$5 tax will be on tickets up to \$65 instead of \$60.
