**BRITISH VESSELS
RAIDERS' VICTIMS**

Five Torpedoed by German
Submarine Which Destroyed
Lusitania.

OFF SCILLY ISLANDS

One Steamer Sunk While En-
gaged in Rescuing Crew
of Another.

LONDON, July 2.—Three British
steamers, the *Caucasian*, *Inglemoor*
and *Wesbury*, the *barque Sardinia* and
the schooner *L. C. Tower*, which were re-
ported today to have been sunk by
German submarines in the vicinity of
the Scilly Islands and off south Ire-
land.

The *Caucasian* met her fate south-
west of Lizard Head, on the coast of
Cornwall, on Thursday morning. She
was engaged in picking up her crew
the *Inglemoor* fell a victim to the same
submarine.

The *Caucasian*, when the submarine
opened fire, was given full steam in an
endeavor to escape. Not until the
steamer was struck by several shots,
one of which demolished the wheel,
did her captain surrender. The crew
of the steamer took to the boats. The
submarine hunted along the coast for
eight shells into the vessel. A dog be-
longing to the captain of the *Caucasian*
jumped aboard and the captain
plunged from one of the boats into
the rough sea and rescued his pet.

Picked Up Boats.
A few hours later, the submarine ap-
peared on the scene and started pick-
ing up the *Caucasian's* boats. The
Inglemoor had taken the occupants of
the small boats on board when the
submarine emerged and opened fire on
her. Escape being hopeless, the crew
of the *Inglemoor* were rescued, and
the *Wesbury* was rescued in the same
manner.

The crew of the *Inglemoor* and part
of the crew of the *Caucasian* were
landed at Penzance, but one of the
Caucasian's boats, with nineteen men
in her, was being rowed toward
France when last sight of the subma-
rine was seen.

The steamer *Inglemoor* and *Caucasian*
were sunk by the U-39. This
was the submarine which torpedoed
the *Lusitania* and which rescued the
men in the lifeboats from the
torpedoed *Caucasian*.

According to the correspondent at
Plymouth of the Exchange Telegraph
Co., the submarine sank the *Inglemoor*
while that steamer was rescuing
the men in the lifeboats from the
torpedoed *Caucasian*.

**NO CASH FURNISHED
LIBERAL COFFERS**

Sir Rodmond Roblin Has No
Knowledge of Deal Ex-
cept "Saw-Offs."

AGREED TO CIVIL SUIT

Hudson Consented to Suspend
Royal Commission at
Phippen's Instance.

WINNIPEG, July 2.—Sir Rodmond
Roblin on the stand this afternoon
before the "saw-off," which he
investigate the charges made by C. P.
Fullerton, K. C., on behalf of 14 pri-
vate members of the Manitoba leg-
islature, declared he had no knowl-
edge of any matters on which the charges
were alleged to have been based, nor
had he anything to do with the pub-
lication of the charges made. He
stated that he was ignorant of any
arrangements with the Liberals, save
regarding the "saw-off," which he
said had been customary in every
election he had been interested in dur-
ing the whole of his public life.

The counsel pointed out that Dr. Mc-
Fadden, M. L. A., was one of the 14
members mentioned, and that an ar-
rangement for a "saw-off" in connec-
tion with his election protest was one
of the number proposed.

Sir Rodmond said that Dr. McFadden
had known of the "saw-off" in con-
nection with the protest against his
own election, but had raised no
objection. He did not think that a
"saw-off" would be material for a
royal commission's investigation.

No Knowledge of Money
As to the money part of the charges
Sir Rodmond averred he had no
knowledge of any monetary transac-
tion between his cabinet and the Lib-
erals. He said that he was ignorant
as to the circumstances surrounding
his resignation. The negotiations had
been carried on by F. H. Phippen, who
he heard later that Mr. Hudson had
seen the commission in this connec-
tion.

Regarding his resignation, he said
the clause in connection with Mr.
Hudson's charges had been handed to
him by Mr. Phippen, and so far as
he knew, it was a copy of the original
document. He said he did not know
whether Mr. Phippen's copy had
