

### GRAND OPERA HOUSE TO PLAY ALL HIGH-CLASS PRODUCTIONS

#### Historic Theatre to Be the Home Again of the Klav & Erlanger Offerings—Julian Eltinge to Open on Thanksgiving Day.

When the late Sir Henry Irving played the Grand Opera House some years ago he made a curtain speech in which he referred in complimentary terms to the historic playhouse. Its immense stage accommodation and its conveniences for the presentation of massive productions and large companies. It is over forty years since the Grand was first erected and there is not a playhouse on the continent that can boast of a record such as that enjoyed by this famous old theatre. All the leading artists for the past forty years have at one time or another acknowledged the appreciation of a Toronto audience over the footlights of the Grand, and it is gratifying to the leaders of the stage of today to know that they will have an opportunity of dis-

playing their talents on the stage tantamounted at one time by their illustrious predecessors.

**A Fashion Treat.**

The first of the Klav and Erlanger attractions will be presented on Thanksgiving Day, opening with a special holiday music, when Julian Eltinge, the star all admirers will present his newest and greatest success, "Cousin Lucy," direct from the Geo. M. Cohan Theatre, New York. On the opening performance Mr. Eltinge will wear a wardrobe of special creations which are made and sent to him each week by New York's foremost designers. These gowns represent advanced styles, which will be on view in local stores for six months. No woman can afford to miss this fashionable treat.

Among the first of the notable offerings booked are the following: The famous English stars, George Arliss, in a new play, and Cyril Maude (last seen here in "Grumpy"), who will also present a new play; Montgomery and Stone in the biggest of New York's musical successes, "Chin Chin"; Henry Miller and Ruth Chatterton, co-stars in Jean Webster's world-famous "Daddy Long-Legs"; Mrs. Patrick Campbell, in a new play; "Potsah and Perimutter"; "Under Cover," said to be one of the greatest dramatic productions of recent years; "Kick In," the latest and brightest of comedy successes, with Richard Bennett in the lead; "The Song of Songs," and "It Pays to Advertise."

A. J. Small will personally supervise the bookings, many of which will be played at his other houses in London, Hamilton, Kingston, Ottawa and other cities in Ontario. James W. Cowan, who has been in charge of the Grand for the past fifteen years, will continue as house manager here.

**COPENHAGEN, Oct. 1.**—The Norwegian barque Actia, 568 tons gross, with a cargo of props from Krageroe to Leith, was set on fire by a German submarine at a point 20 miles south of the Nahe, at the southern extremity of Norway. The Actia's crew of 11 men was towed in a small boat by the submarine to a point on the shore near the Nahe.
