

The company, in order to reap the full benefits of their faith and enterprize, will be obliged to maintain control of their blood supply just as Silver Fox breeders once held control of the breeding stock of foxes. In the latter case they were finally beaten because of the fact that wild silver foxes were captured in the wilds by others. But, in the case of Karakul sheep, only importations from Bokhara can disrupt the American control. It is therefore proposed and planned to maintain majority ownership of all full blood live stock sold until the business

is well established in America. After that time the parent company will still control the sale of breeding rams. It is not anticipated that others can secure any importations from Bokhara.

There are at Charlottetown, P. E. I., the property of the Dr. C. C. Young Karakule Sheep Company, the seven unrelated male blood lines mentioned above and their descendants numbering nineteen full-blood rams and twenty-eight full-blood ewes. Only one of the rams and three of the ewes are fine wools. Fourteen
