First Aim Restitution.

First Aim Restitution.

One of the main principles of the system is restitution for losses caused by thefts by persons who do not properly belong to the criminal class. Probation officers are appointed by the municipalities, to the payment of whom the state contributes a share. These officers begin their duties at 6.30 a.m., by interviewing prisoners who get into the police dragnet during the night. Where the offence is a minor theft the officers arrange with relatives to make restitution on easy terms. The offender is then given a probation card, good for one year, and he is expected to report monthly to an officer. If at the end of the year the offender has given satisfactory evidence of good behavior and has restored the stolen property, the card is cancelled, and the probation er escapes the disgrace of appearing in court and of having the offence we


