33,000,000 POUNDS OF BUTTER Sent to Britain From Canada Last Year.

Ottawa, Aug. 30.-Returns just published of Canada's foreign trade for the year ending June 30th, 1906, show British market totalled 214,877,077 lbs., of a value of \$24,300,908. This is almost the same quality as found its way to the United Kingdom in 1805, but the better prices prevailing in 1906 showed an increase in the value of this trade of \$4,126,697.

Thirty-two million nine hundred and four thousand nine hundred and ninety pounds of Canadian butter, valued at \$6,802,003, found its way to Britain last year, which represents an increase of 2,914,321 lbs., and an increase in value

of \$1.283,004. Of Canadian bacon, 98,173,242 lbs. valued at \$11.563,619 were sold in England, which is a considerable decrease from the preceding year, when the trade was 116,705.157 lbs., worth \$12,-

twelve months.

marketed in Britain, compared with 38,190,651 lbs., valued at \$3,525,250, in 1905.
