

Clogs Worn by English Workmen,

Clogs Worn by English Workmen. Shoe and Leather Heporter : An acknow-ledged authority has estimated there are at least 4,000,000 pairs of clogs sold in the northern countiles of England every year. Different woods are preferred in different districts. The workers in factories and other indoor occupations in such districts as Bolton, Oldham and Preston prefer a sole made from either aider or birch, while in the colliery districts, such as Wigan, beech, birch and ash are most generally used, the first mamed in each instance be-ing in greatest demand.
