CHARGED WITH DESERTION.

Couple Arrested by Detectives Said to Have Abandoned Infant.

The exposure is said to have caused the death of the child.

TRADE COMMISSIONERS NOW.

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—An order in council has been passed changing the title of Canadian trade agents of the first rank to "trade commissioners." The title will apply only to native Canadians who devote their whole time to the work of promoting Canada's trade interests. They are Messrs. Jackson, McNamara, McKinnon and Ball in England; Ross and Lake in Australia; Maclean in Japan; Donley, Dron, France, and Arnand, Newfoundland. The term "commissioner" carries a larger significance.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Oct. 24.—This was a typical autumn afternoon. Everything was calm and peaceful, and the clear, cool atmosphere gave one the impression that there was "nothing doing" in this quiet local spot. NORTH TORONTO.

Incoming Pastor Gets Hearty and Unanimous Welcome.

NORTH TORONTO, Oct. 24.—The county police court, on Thursday morning, was presided over by J. A. Ramsden, clerk of the Court of York, in the absence of Police Magistrate Ellis. The excitement prevailed in the court house when J. Y. Healey, who was charged with indecent assault upon Beatrice Woolwin of Gamble-avenue, Oct. 16, did not answer to his name. Township voters' list in the Reform interest on the bench of the alleged offence was committed, and a warrant was executed for his arrest on the alleged charge mentioned. The crown accepted a \$500 cash-bond from Dr. Foster and the hearing was set for this morning. The accused had engaged counsel to defend him. The trial has been postponed till to-morrow (Friday), and if the accused does not appear in court on a bench warrant for Healey's arrest. It was learned that Healey left for Hamilton on the 9:37 train this morning from South Parkdale station, without having his fare prepaid, telling the station agent that he lost his pocket-book, and went on the train. Brown left for Hamilton on the 2 p.m. train, armed with a warrant for Healey's arrest.
