NO LONGER A CANON.

Bishop DuMoulin Accepts His Election.

LAYMEN GAVE HIM THEIR VOTES

The Selection of the Toronto Divine Unanimous.

lard Fight of the Previous Day Was Settled on the First Ballot in the Synod of Niagara Testerday-A Victory for the Evangelical Section of the Church -The Good News Was Sent Early to Bishop Hamilton's Successor, New in

Hamilton, May 13.-(Special.)-If Canon DuMoulin of St. James' Cathedral, Toronto, wants to resign his charge in Toronto, he will be Bishop of Niagara, for this morning the Synod on the first ballot almost unanimously elected him Bishop, and since has been waiting anxiously for a reply to a telegram to him, asking if he would accept the bishopric of this diocese, and after having met and adjourned several times during the day, at 5 o'clock adjourned till 8, feeling sure that at that hour he would have replied to the message. His churchwarden, Col. Grasett of Toronto, said he was at present in New York, but he had left there, and was located at Middletown, Conn. It was a general surprise this morning when the announcement was made that he had been elected Bishop, in view of the strong support the lay delegates gave Dean Carmichael on the last ballot last night, but after the adjournment of the Synod the laity made a concession, agreeing to support the clerical candidate, and the result of

the first ballot was: DuMoulin, 55 clerical and 47 lay votes; Carmichael, 2 and 6; Bishop of Algoma, 2 and 3; spoiled clerical ballots 2. The votes necessary for his election were 31 clerical and 30 laity.
Rural Dean Armitage moved, and John Hoodless seconded, that the election be unanimous, but Rev. Robert Ker of St. Catharines maintained that the only way in which the election could be made unanimous was by the ballots, but there was a general response to the motion, and all appeared eminently gratified with the result.
While the lay delegates at first supported another man, their preference was purely on personal grounds, but so far as the ritualistic or evangelical aspect of the case was concerned, had no preference, knowing Canon Du-Moulin to be moderate in his views, and unusually capable and brilliant.
Should the bishop-elect accept the position, it will be a victory for the evangelical section of the church, although the ritualities voted for no high churchman in the balloting, and Algoma, 2 and 3; spoiled clerical bal-

place about June 1, and the Synod will meet on June 24. Resolutions expressing satisfaction at Canon DuMoulin's acceptance and to make arrangements for his reception were passed.

The Standing Committee will make up the deficiency to the \$75,000 endowment fund, the interest on which goes to the Bishop, and \$2000 of the \$4000 deficiency was guaranteed this evening, which is an evidence of the general approval of the election of the new Bishop. A committee was appointed to draft a memorial to Bishop Hamilton.

John Philip DuMoulin was born in and then became incumbent at St.
Thomas, Hamilton. In 1875 he became rector of St. Martin's, Montreal, and in 1883 was appointed canon of St.
James'. In 1891 the degree of D.C.L. was con-ferred on him by Trinity University.
